3. Programme Description

3.1 Overview

International Relations and Politics at Lincoln introduces students to a range of major political and economic institutions, actors, ideas and issues at a national and international level. Conflict and cooperation are core themes within this programme, themes which are explored in relation to states, intergovernmental organisations and other non state actors, and in national, regional and global settings.

At level one, students are given a broad introduction to the actors, issues and concepts relevant to the study of international relations and politics, and to key concepts and thinkers in the social sciences. Students are also introduced to key research skills at this level.

At level two, students will encounter key theoretical approaches to politics and international relations. They will also examine in more depth the operation of global institutions such as the United Nations, as well as exploring the dynamics of national and regional politics in a range of other settings including the USA, the EU, the Middle East and Asia. Students will also broaden their skills set and continue to develop a range of personal and intellectual transferable skills.

At level three, students will focus in particular on development of new forms of political participation, at global, national and local levels. Students at level three will also apply the research skills acquired at levels 1 and 2 with the production of a sustained piece of independent research.

3.2 Aims and Objectives

The BA (Hons) in International Relations and Politics aims to provide students with an education that:

- enables them to develop their critical and intellectual abilities and apply these to an understanding of the world in which they live;
- reflects the major strands in international relations and politics;
- allows students to acquire a range of skills relevant to their studies at the University and beyond;
- encourages the synergy between research and teaching through integrating research knowledge and experience in forms appropriate to teaching and learning.

The objectives of the programme are to:

- provide opportunities for students to obtain an understanding of the historical and contemporary, economic, social and political forces which are shaping the domestic and international environment;
- apply a number of concepts and theories relevant to the study of Politics and International Relations;
- demonstrate an understanding of the theoretical and philosophical underpinnings of some of the main perspectives within Politics and International Relations;
- encourage students to obtain a range of skills and qualities which will assist them in their undergraduate study of the subjects and in subsequent study and/or employment;
- provide intellectual and academic challenges appropriate to undergraduate education, including theoretical as well as practical realms of Politics and International Relations;
- allow students to examine critically a number of key models and theories relating to Politics and International Relations;
- enable students to evaluate differing interpretations and explanations of global issues and developments;
- inculcate the philosophy of independent lifelong learning through the encouragement of qualities such as critical and analytical thinking;

- develop students' abilities to work independently and to develop self-reliance in their choice of topics and methods of investigation;
- allow students to demonstrate an awareness of the disciplines that contribute to the understanding of Politics and International Relations, and provide a framework in which students can use the tools of linked disciplines in an integrated manner.

The BA (Hons) International Relations and Politics responds to the United Kingdom QAA benchmark statement for the subject of Politics and International Relations. Benchmarking Analysis provides a detailed specification of the relationship between this programme's curriculum and the relevant QAA benchmark(s).

Internal contexts:

The BA (Hons) International Relations and Politics seeks to implement the University mission and strategy through providing students with an education and learning experience which will equip them to compete in the world of work and by providing them with a range of skills, knowledge and abilities which will enable them to build upon their University experience as lifelong learners. It does this by operating within the framework set by University policies and practices and by building on initiatives in teaching and learning as well as staff research strengths in this and related areas. The subjects of International Relations and Politics are located in the School of Social and Political Sciences, part of the College of Social Science. The School possesses a strong staff team. This is reflected in a number of ways including the variety of specialisms, professional expertise and contacts with the academic community, and in research. All staff teaching on the International Relations and Politics programme possess relevant higher degrees and are active in research and publication. Staff who contribute to International Relations and Politics have substantial teaching experience and expertise and have shown the capability to develop and adapt new teaching techniques and materials to the new environment. The use of IT skills is a central part of the programme, both in terms of teaching and learning. All staff either have or will have obtained a recognised teaching qualification by 2015/16. Politics and International Relations formed the basis of submissions to the 2008 RAE and REF2014.

Considerable emphasis is placed on the employability agenda. The Social Engagement module provides students with the opportunity to interact with organisations outside the University, through for example, voluntary or paid work, or mentoring within a service organisation, and to reflect critically on the nature of this activity. We also organise alumni events where former students come and talk about their careers. Other relevant activities may include a study period abroad and placements. Such initiatives are designed to develop awareness of professional practice, employability and transferable skills.

External contexts:

The subjects of International Relations and Politics are two of the University's key social science provisions, reflecting strengths in both teaching and research. The teaching of International Relations and Politics at the University of Lincoln can clearly be seen as having a great deal in common with that in other universities in a number of respects:

- the grounding of the study of Politics and International Relations in a social scientific framework, with an emphasis on a range of theoretical and applied perspectives;
- the study of key areas of International Relations and Politics such as political theory, comparative politics and area studies, international organisations, policy analysis, political economy, and coverage

of key issues such as globalisation, human rights conflict, new social movements;

- providing an academic education which will equip students for postgraduate study;

Students studying International Relations and Politics at Lincoln are well regarded outside the University with a number of students successfully undertaking postgraduate study at a range of institutions in Britain and abroad.

Staff teaching on the International Relations and Politics degree are active in the wider academic and professional communities with widespread participation in a range of activities associated with these. These include PSA executive committee membership, External Examining, editorial board responsibilities, academic publication, conference organisation, conference attendance, and so on.

- 8 suspend personal judgement and reflect on challenging ideas, reflecting the existence of contrasting and competing interpretations;
- 9 identify and critically evaluate the links between diverse phenomena and issues.

5. Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategies

5.1. Learning and Teaching Strategy

The teaching and learning strategy adopted within the BA (Hons) International Relations and Politics derives from a commitment to student-centred learning, with an emphasis on problem-solving, research and analytical skills. The range of teaching and learning methods is matched by a variety of modes of assessment, as shown in the module outlines.

There are a range of transferable skills that might be expected from International Relations and Politics graduates, including IT skills, analytical and critical abilities, presentation and group-work skills, awareness of their own strengths and weaknesses, ability to find and organise information, manage time and debate and negotiate views. These skills, together with the knowledge base provided by the study of International Relations and Politics, are valued by employers. The need to develop transferable skills, critical and theoretical abilities and provide a knowledge base, together have been taken into account in the development of individual modules, and the programme as a whole, and are reflected in the learning outcomes. At levels 1 and 2 the programme presents and develops skills in a context clearly applicable to the subjects. The programme also draws upon the research strengths of staff to provide an underpinning for much of the teaching and learning experience, particularly at levels 2 and 3.

The design of the International Relations and Politics programme at Lincoln reflects the strong interdisciplinary nature of the subject and of the School of Social and Political Sciences. Reflecting these interdisciplinary strengths, the programme incorporates modules, such as Key Social Science Concepts, Applying Research and the Independent Study, which are common to the School's family of undergraduate degree programmes. These interdisciplinary strengths are also evident in a range of optional modules, for example, Human Rights and War Crimes and Genocide. Where appropriate students will be able to study optional modules from other Schools within the University.

Whilst we endeavour to run as many option modules as practically possible, it is inevitable that not all option choices will run in every academic year. This will be dependent upon a number of factors, including staff availability and numbers choosing particular modules. We will, however, inform students of whether or not modules are running as soon as possible, and certainly by the end of April in the preceding year for levels two and three.

The programme ensures compliance with the Framework for Higher Education Qualifications in the following ways:

- The BA (Hons) International Relations and Politics offers a coherent programme of study involving appropriate levels, clear exit points and progression. The teaching, learning and assessment strategy reflects this with a balance between modules and across levels;
- Students studying at Certificate level will have a sound knowledge of the basic concepts of International Relations and Politics and will have learned how to take different approaches to solving problems. They will be able to communicate accurately, and will have the qualities needed for employment requiring the exercise of some personal responsibility;
- Students studying at Intermediate level will have developed a sound understanding of the principles of International Relations and Politics, and will have learned to apply those principles more widely. Through this, they will have learned to evaluate the appropriateness of different approaches to solving problems. Their studies have an employability dimension enabling them to perform effectively through the enhancement of transferable skills across a range of modules;
- An Honours graduate will have developed an understanding of a complex body of knowledge, some of it at the current boundaries of an academic discipline afforded by the involvement of staff

research in the curriculum. Through this, the graduate will have developed analytical techniques and problem-solving skills that can be applied in many types of employment. The graduate will be able to evaluate evidence, arguments and assumptions, to reach sound judgements, and to communicate effectively.

Aims of the study abroad period:

The School believes that an option to study overseas is a valuable educational opportunity for students. Provision of this opportunity supports the educational aims of the International Relations and Politics programme and enhances the distinctiveness of the degree at Lincoln. The option to take an additional year of study with an approved partner institution abroad has been an integral part of IR provision at Lincoln since 1996.

The optional year abroad is intended to:

- Enable students to benefit from studying within a cross cultural environment;
- Expose students to a wider academic and cultural experience;
- Enhance their future employment opportunities;
- Increase their cultural and professional mobility.

Students will receive introductory information about the opportunity to study abroad during the first year induction programme and have the opportunity to indicate their interest in this option at the beginning of level two. This allows the students time to reflect upon the possibility of study abroad and to consider the implications of this choice for their financial situation and their personal circumstances. During semester B of level two, students start the application process to study at the partner institution and discuss their proposed programme of study with the International Relations Programme Leader (or their nominee). The programme for the period of overseas study will be drawn from suitable modules available from the departments of International Studies, Peace and Conflict Studies, History, Politics, Philosophy, Politics and Economics and World Languages and Cultures at partner institutions. The programme of study must be approved by the appropriate academic staff at both the University of Lincoln and the host institution. Opportunity to participate in the optional year abroad is dependent on the students' successful completion of level two assessments and their acceptance by the partner institution. During their period of study at the partner institution, students will be contacted by the Programme leader (or their nominee) by phone and/or email to discuss their progress; in addition, appropriate staff at the host institution will be contacted as necessary to discuss the students' progress. Upon completion of their study period abroad, the students return to Lincoln University for their final level of study and receive a separate and distinctive transcript of their achievements and the programme followed, specifically related to this additional year of study abroad.

5.2. Assessment Strategy

A variety of modes of assessment are employed at each level which are designed to test and enhance students' knowledge, skills and abilities, as well as to prepare them for the demands of work. Assessments test students' attainments of learning outcomes that demonstrate and encourage not only the knowledge base but also the development of transferable skills. A variety of modes of assessment are employed at each level which are designed to test and enhance students' knowledge, skills and abilities, as well as to prepare them for the demands of work. Assessments test students' attainments of learning outcomes that demonstrate and encourage not only the knowledge base, but also the development of transferable skills across the programme. Written communication skills are developed through policy briefs, essays and examinations; oral communication skills

through presentations and simulation participation; literature searching and review through essays, examinations, critical reviews and reading journals. IT skills are embedded in many modules and include word-processing, statistical data handling, the use of electronic search engines and other resources. The University's VLE is used extensively for the distribution of teaching resources and for assessment delivery and feedback.

The assessment map gives a top-level indication of the scheduling and distribution of assessment modes within the programme. Details of module assessment strategy are included with each module specification.
