3. Programme Description

3.1 Overview

Politics at Lincoln introduces students to a range of major political institutions, actors, ideas and issues. At level 1, students will receive a broad introduction to politics at a national (British) and global level, and to key concepts and thinkers in the social sciences. They will also have the opportunity to begin to develop research skills.

At level 2 students will consider the core ideas underpinning politics and closely related disciplines, such as international relations, and will begin to apply these to the study of politics in a range of other settings including the USA, the EU, the Middle East, and Asia. They will also broaden their skill set and begin to develop a portfolio of transferable skills. At level 3 they will focus in particular on the development of new forms of political participation at global, national and local levels, and alternative approaches to the political, through for example, gender and sexuality. Students at this level will also apply the skills they have acquired at levels 1 and 2 with the production of a sustained piece of independent research.

By the end of their degree students should have a deep and broad understanding of politics as a discipline, a concept and an activity. They will have developed a wide range transferable skills suitable both for employment in a range of sectors and postgraduate study.

3.2 Aims and Objectives

The BA (Hons) Politics aims to provide students with an education that:

- reflects the major strands in political studies;
- enables students to develop their critical and intellectual abilities and apply these to an understanding of the world in which they live;
- allows students to acquire a range of skills relevant to their studies at the University and beyond;
- encourages the synergy between research and teaching through integrating research knowledge and experience in forms appropriate to teaching and learning.

The objectives of the subject are to:

- enable students to demonstrate an understanding of the vocabularies of Politics and some of the key contributing sub-areas of the subject, such as International Relations;
- provide opportunities for students to obtain an understanding of present-day political institutions, political processes, ideas and issues;
- encourage students to apply concepts and theories to the analysis of political issues, ideas and institutions;
- enable students to demonstrate an understanding of the theoretical and philosophical underpinnings of the main perspectives within politics;
- encourage students to obtain a range of skills and qualities which will assist them in their undergraduate study of the subject and in subsequent study and/or employment;
- provide intellectual and academic challenges appropriate to undergraduate education, including theoretical as well as practical realms of political studies;
- encourage students to apply critical thinking and independent learning to their work;
- develop students' abilities to work independently and to develop self-reliance in their choice of topics and methods of investigation.

The BA (Hons) Politics is distinctive in that it provides both a strong British and international approach to the subject, whilst drawing significantly upon the research strengths of staff, including in areas

such as international sociology, political economy, public policy and human rights.

QAA Subject Benchmark Statement(s):

The BA (Hons) Politics responds to the United Kingdom QAA benchmark statement for the subject of Politics and International Relations.

Internal contexts:

The BA (Hons) Politics seeks to implement the University mission and strategy through providing students with an education and learning experience which will equip them to compete in the world of work and by providing them with a range of skills, knowledge and abilities which will enable them to build upon their University experience as lifelong learners. It does this by operating within the framework set by University policies and practices, and by building on initiatives in teaching and learning as well as staff research strengths in this and related areas.

The subject of Politics is located in the School of Social and Political Sciences, part of the College of Social Sciences. The School possesses a strong staff team. This is reflected in a number of ways including the variety of specialisms, professional expertise and contacts with the academic community, and in research.

All staff teaching on the Politics programme possess relevant higher degrees and are research active. Staff who contribute to the programme have substantial teaching experience and expertise and have shown the capability to develop and adapt new teaching techniques and material. The use of IT skills is a central part of the programme both in terms of teaching and learning. Politics formed the basis of submissions to the 2008 Research Assessment Exercise and the 2014 Research Excellence Framework.

External contexts:

The BA (Hons) Politics is one of the University's key social science provisions, reflecting strengths in both teaching and research. The teaching of Politics at the University of Lincoln can clearly be seen as having a great deal in common with that in other universities in a number of respects:

- the grounding of the study of Politics in a social scientific framework but with an emphasis on a range of theoretical and applied perspectives and practical politics;
- the study of key areas of Politics, such as constitutional politics, policy making, comparative politics, political theory and political behaviour;
- coverage of key issues in Politics, such as the development and role of political parties, human rights and new social movements;
- providing an academic education which will equip students for postgraduate study.

Staff teaching on the Politics degree are active in the wider academic and professional communities with widespread participation in a range of activities associated with these. These include PSA executive committee membership, external examining, editorial board responsibilities, academic publication, conference organisation, conference attendance.

- 4 The theoretical and philosophical underpinnings of the key perspectives within Politics;
- 5 The limitations and strengths of the main approaches to research and analysis into Politics;
- 6 A range of major contemporary issues and debates relating to Politics.

4.2 Subject Specific Intellectual Skills

On successful completion of this programme a student will be able to:

- 7 Identify, interpret, evaluate and apply a range of theories, ideologies and explanations relevant to the discipline of Politics;
- 8 Identify, access, interpret and evaluate critically a diverse range of quantitative and qualitative information;
- 9 Suspend personal judgement and reflect on challenging ideas, recognising that politics comprises contrasting and competing interpretations of social and political phenomena;
- 10 Identify and critically evaluate the links between diverse political phenomena and issues.

4.3 Subject Specific Practical Skills

On successful completion of this programme a student will be able to:

- 11 Undertake sustained subject-relevant independent research;
- 12 Construct, analyse and evaluate different forms of argument and advance these through discussion and negotiation;
- 13 Evaluate and apply a range of different theories, ideologies and explanations that are appropriate to the study of Politics.

4.4 Transferable Skills and Attributes

On successful completion of this programme a student will be able to:

- 14 Demonstrate a range of ICT skills including data collection, analysis and presentation;
- 15 Retrieve, record and interpret data from a range of sources;
- 16 Work, learn and pursue specific objectives in a manner which is both self motivated and responsive to appropriate supervision;
- 17 Identify personal strengths and weaknesses and understand the importance of continued reflection on experience, development and education;
- 18 Work under pressure, manage their own time and meet deadlines;
- 19 Maintain a critical stance with regard to opinion and evidence;
- 20 Communicate ideas effectively and fluently, both orally and in writing;
- 21 Present different types of materials using a variety of techniques and media;

5. Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategies

5.1. Learning and Teaching Strategy

The learning and teaching strategy adopted within the BA (Hons) Politics derives from a commitment to student-centred learning, which draws on the ethos of 'student as producer', with an emphasis on problem-solving, research and analytical skills. The range of teaching and learning methods is matched by a variety of modes of assessment, as shown in the module outlines. There are a range of transferable skills that might be expected from Politics graduates, including IT skills, quantitative and qualitative research skills, analytical and critical thinking skills, oral and written presentation skills, the ability to work effectively in a group as well as a capacity for independent learning, ability to find and organise information, manage time and debate and negotiate views. Students are also expected to be able to reflect on their skills and their individual strengths and weaknesses. These skills, together with the knowledge base provided by the study of Politics, are valued by employers. The need to develop transferable skills, critical and analytical abilities and provide a knowledge base, together have been taken into account in the development of individual modules, and the programme as a whole, and are reflected in the learning outcomes. At levels 1 and 2 the programme presents and develops skills in a context clearly applicable to the subject. The subject also draws upon the research strengths of staff to provide an underpinning for much of the teaching and learning experience, particularly at levels 2 and 3, where modules such as Parliamentary Studies, New Social Movements and the Politics of Masculinity, benefit from being informed by the acknowledged research specialisms of the teaching staff.

As already noted, the design of the BA (Hons) Politics programme reflects the strong interdisciplinary nature of the subject as well as the School of Social and Political Sciences. In particular there is congruence between the BA (Hons) International Relations and the BA (Hons) Politics at Lincoln (reflected in a common level 1 programme of study) as well as the other social sciences subjects of Social Policy, Criminology and Sociology. This is particularly reflected in the provision of interdisciplinary modules at all levels including, Key Social Science Concepts, Human Rights, War Crimes and Genocide. At levels 2 and 3 Politics students are offered a diverse range of optional modules including those drawn from the School's subjects of International Relations, Criminology, Sociology and Social Policy. Where appropriate, students will be able to study optional modules from the Lincoln Law School at levels 2 and 3.

The programme ensures compliance with the Framework for Higher Education Qualifications in the following ways:

- the BA (Hons) Politics offers a coherent programme of study involving appropriate levels, clear exit points and progression. The teaching, learning and assessment strategy reflects this with a balance between modules and across levels;
- students studying at Certificate level will have a sound knowledge of the basic concepts of politics and will have learned how to take different approaches to solving problems. They will be able to communicate accurately, and will have the qualities needed for employment requiring the exercise of some personal responsibility;
- students studying at Intermediate level will have developed a sound understanding of the principles of politics, and will have learned to apply those principles more widely. Through this, they will have learned to evaluate the appropriateness of different approaches to solving problems. Their studies have an employability dimension enabling them to perform effectively through the enhancement of transferable skills across modules;
- an Honours graduate will have developed an understanding of a complex body of knowledge, some of it at the current boundaries of an academic discipline afforded by the involvement of staff research in the curriculum. Through this, the graduate will have developed analytical techniques and

problem-solving skills that can be applied in many types of employment. The graduate will be able to evaluate evidence, arguments and assumptions, to reach sound judgments, and to communicate effectively.

Aims of the study abroad:

The School believes that an option to study overseas is a valuable educational opportunity for students. Provision of this opportunity supports the educational aims of the Politics programme and enhances the distinctiveness of the degree at Lincoln. The option to take an additional year of study with an approved partner institution abroad has been an integral part of IR provision at Lincoln since 1996, and is now offered as part of the Politics programme.

The optional year abroad is intended to:

- Enable students to benefit from studying within a cross cultural environment;
- Expose students to a wider academic and cultural experience;
- Enhance their future employment opportunities;
- Increase their cultural and professional mobility.

Students will receive introductory information about the opportunity to study abroad during the first year induction programme and have the opportunity to indicate their interest in this option at the beginning of level two. This allows the students time to reflect upon the possibility of study abroad and to consider the implications of this choice for their financial situation and their personal circumstances. During semester B of level two, students start the application process to study at the partner institution and discuss their proposed programme of study with the Programme Leader (or their nominee). The programme for the period of overseas study will be drawn from suitable modules available from the departments of International Studies, Peace and Conflict Studies, History, Politics, Philosophy, Politics and Economics and World Languages and Cultures at partner institutions. The programme of study must be approved by the appropriate academic staff at both the University of Lincoln and the host institution. Opportunity to participate in the optional year abroad is dependent on the students' successful completion of level two assessments and their acceptance by the partner institution. During their period of study at the partner institution, students will be contacted by the Programme leader (or their nominee) by phone and/or email to discuss their progress; in addition, appropriate staff at the host institution will be contacted as necessary to discuss the students' progress. Upon completion of their study period abroad, the students return to Lincoln University for their final level of study and receive a separate and distinctive transcript of their achievements and the programme followed, specifically related to this additional year of study abroad.

5.2. Assessment Strategy

A variety of modes of assessment are employed at each level which are designed to test and enhance students' knowledge, skills and abilities as well as to prepare them for the demands of work. Assessments test students' attainments of learning outcomes that demonstrate and encourage not only the knowledge base, but also the development of transferable skills across the programme. Written communication skills are developed through essays, examinations, report writing, weekly journals. Oral communication skills are assessed through presentations and participation in debate through for example the Model United Nations. Research skills come through the research strand, which features at all levels of the programme and includes assessed research design, literature review, quantitative and qualitative analysis, and sustained independent study. IT skills are embedded in many modules and include word processing, statistical data handling, the use of electronic search engines and other resources. The University's VLE is used extensively for the

distribution and teaching resources and for assessment delivery and feedback. Assessment Map gives a top-level indication of the scheduling and distribution of assessment modes within the programme. Details of module assessment strategy are included with each module specification.

The total number of credit points required for the achievement of Diploma of Higher Education (DipHE) is 240.
