

Sustainability at Lincoln



One of the world's great historic cities, Lincoln is renowned for its fusion of old and new, seamlessly blending medieval heritage with modern city living.

Lincoln is a small city with a friendly community feel but it still offers a rich variety of attractions, activities, and amenities to keep you entertained throughout your time here, from socialising, sports, and shopping, to culture, castles, and countryside pursuits.

At Your Leisure

Just a short walk away from campus, you'll find a range of restaurants, cafes, and bars that overlook the beautiful marina area, while in the centre of Lincoln, you'll be spoilt for choice with the eclectic mix of pubs and entertainment venues that are available.

Lincoln offers a great shopping experience – its high streets and side streets, including the newly developed Cornhill Quarter, are home to a range of independent and boutique stores alongside national brands and chains.

Step back in time and take a trip up the aptly named Steep Hill, which is the gateway to Lincoln's historic Cathedral Quarter and Bailgate area, where character-filled streets are lined with quirky shops and enticing eateries. The area is home to Lincoln Cathedral, one of Europe's most celebrated medieval buildings and finest examples of Gothic architecture, and Lincoln Castle, where you can walk in the footsteps of kings and see one of only four surviving originals of the 1215 Magna Carta. Every Christmas, crowds throng the local streets to enjoy the attractions at one of Europe's largest seasonal markets, browsing the hundreds of stalls offering a treasure trove of gifts and goodies.

Culture and Sports

There is a lively programme of theatre and festival events in Lincoln, and the city also boasts a range of museums and public art galleries. The University's theatre and art gallery, both located on our Brayford Pool Campus, provide a home for new contemporary performances, featuring the next generation of artists and showcasing new artistic ideas.

Our Siren Radio station serves both University and city communities, while the new Barbican Creative Hub, located across from Lincoln Central Railway Station, is giving artists and creatives new opportunities to connect with each other and the public.

Lincoln is also home to a wide range of sports and leisure facilities, including cinemas, gyms, swimming pools, and cycle routes. Alternatively, you can watch one of our local sports teams in action or catch one of the many live sporting events that take place in and around the city.

The Great Outdoors

You don't have to travel far to experience the great outdoors. Lincoln itself is home to several parks and beautiful waterways and is surrounded by picturesque countryside and stunning landscapes, ready to be explored through country walks and cycling trips.

Lincolnshire also offers plenty of options for great days out. From country parks, nature reserves, and historic houses, such as nearby Doddington Hall, to aviation heritage, numerous festivals, and visits to the popular seaside towns, there's always plenty to do in one of England's largest counties.

Overseas students can come to Lincoln and complete part of their course here, while Lincoln students can choose from a range of global opportunities to study, work, or volunteer abroad.

International Students

We also offer a range of courses to help prepare you for degree-level study in the UK, as well as free term-time courses designed to develop your English language and academic study skills. These include the International Year One and International Foundation Year programmes offered by our International College.

All of our accommodation is either on campus or a short distance away, which means that almost everything you could need is right on your doorstep. So whether you are attending lectures and seminars, wanting to use our on-campus learning spaces and the library, or are heading into the city centre to grab a bite to eat and socialise with friends, it's all just a few minutes' walk from your new home.

We offer a range of affordable accommodation options to help you get the most out of your student experience, with prices starting from as little as £95 a week (for non en-suite Lincoln Courts rooms in the 2023/24 academic year).

Feel at Home

One of the reasons why our students feel at home at Lincoln is the sense of community here. As well as offering well-equipped and contemporary rooms, our purpose-built accommodation includes great social spaces and communal areas where you can hang out, chat, and make new friends.

Our selection of fully furnished complexes includes Lincoln Courts, Viking House, and Cygnet Wharf. Our newest development, St Marks, features green outdoor spaces with plenty of seating, where you can take time out and relax with your housemates in between lectures. Cygnet Wharf has been designed specifically for first-year students, which is ideal if you are living away from home for the first time. We also have residences at Valentine Court and 179 High Street, which include furnished, self-catering apartments. Most house between three and 12 students and feature bedrooms with en-suite facilities.

All our accommodation is managed by our helpful Accommodation Services Team who can offer a wealth of advice, from when you start thinking about university to your time living with us here on campus. Our Residence Life Team is also on hand to help and support you from the moment you arrive. Our teams can provide you with information on disabled access and any other specific requirements. Accommodation is also available via established third party providers and private landlords in locations across the city.

How to Apply

Once you have formally accepted your academic offer from the University via UCAS, you can apply for accommodation using our online application system. This typically opens in November each year and you can visit our website for the most up-to-date information.


Academic Support

Adjusting to your course and a new way of learning takes time, and it's good to have someone to talk to. That's why we connect our students with a personal tutor. Health and Wellbeing

It is our policy to offer a place to every suitably qualified applicant with a disability wherever possible and the Student Wellbeing Team is happy to discuss your specific needs and the support we can offer.



Funding Your Study

We know that going to university is a big decision and many families are considering their options with the rising cost of living. At Lincoln, we believe that financial background should never be a barrier to higher education.

Thanks to our location in the heart of the city centre, almost everything our students could need is within walking distance, meaning most don't need to worry about bringing a car or catching public transport to get around, helping them to save money.

Our affordable accommodation options shouldn't break the bank either, with prices starting from as little as £95 a week (for non en-suite Lincoln Courts rooms in the 2023/24 academic year). The costs of food, drinks, and social activities are competitive in Lincoln, and our new LinCard can help by offering up to 15 per cent cashback on everyday essentials and special occasion purchases at many high street and online retailers.

You could also earn some money while you study to help with your day-to-day expenses through the University Campus Jobs service. The dedicated Campus Jobs Team can support you throughout the recruitment process, helping you find flexible work that fits around your studies.

Loans and Allowances


It's important to remember that many of our students apply for loans to help cover their tuition fees and living costs, and the University also offers a range of scholarships and bursaries. UK full-time student tuition fees for 2024 undergraduate entry at the University of Lincoln are £9,250 per year. Most students cover the cost by applying for a Tuition Fee Loan, which is paid directly to the University. You won't start repaying your loan until you've finished your studies and are earning at least £27,295 a year, and the amount you repay will depend on how much you earn. Students can apply for a means-tested Maintenance Loan of up to £9,978 per academic year, which would be paid into your bank account at the start of each term.

The fees and funding system differs for part-time and international students, and all fees and repayment terms quoted may be subject to change in line with Government policy. 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Applying to Lincoln



Choosing Your Degree

What you decide to study at university depends on what subjects you enjoy and any future career aspirations you may have. You can browse the various courses available at Lincoln by subject area in this prospectus, with more detailed course information available on our website.

Most students will choose to study for what is known as a BA or BSc, which is a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree, but you will also see that there are other undergraduate degree qualification titles, such as BEng (Bachelor of Engineering), LLB (Bachelor of Laws), and BM (Bachelor of Medicine). These relate to the subject area being studied.

Our courses typically take three years to complete full-time, although some do offer opportunities to study abroad for a year or take a work placement in industry, adding an additional year to the programme. We also offer integrated Master's programmes in some subject areas, such as MEng, MPhys, and MBio, which take four years to complete and lead to a higher-level qualification.

If you already have a specific role in mind for your future career – whether it's working as a nurse, midwife, social worker, or lawyer – we offer a range of professionally accredited vocational courses that can help you take those first steps into the profession.



Checking Entry Requirements

An overview of the typical entry requirements for individual courses is available in this prospectus, but it's important that you visit our website to ensure you have the detailed information you need. As you will see, we accept a wide range of qualifications for entry, including A Levels, T Levels, BTEC Extended Diplomas, Diplomas and Subsidiary Diplomas, European and International Baccalaureate Diplomas, Advanced Diplomas, EPQ, and Access to Higher Education Diplomas.

The University requires at least a grade 4/C in GCSE English Language, or equivalent, for all courses, and some programmes have specific additional requirements. However, if you don't meet the standard entry qualifications, we may still be able to help. We offer Foundation Years in certain subject areas for those who do not meet our standard entry requirements or who want to explore a subject area further before committing to a named degree programme. Our dedicated Admissions Team can also look at any prior experience and qualifications you might have and offset them against our standard entry requirements.



Checking Important Information

It's important that you have all the information you need to make an informed decision on what you want to study. This includes typical contact hours, a comprehensive list of core and optional modules, details of fees and any additional costs you may incur, modes of delivery, and a breakdown of assessment methods. All of this information is available on the course pages of our website. You may notice that some courses are labelled as 'subject to validation' or 'subject to revalidation'. This is the process the University goes through when introducing new courses or updating existing ones to ensure they are relevant and reflect changes in subject areas and developments in industry.



Submitting Your Application

Once you've read all the available information about studying at Lincoln and chosen the right course for you, you can submit your application online at www.ucas.com. Applications open in September 2023. The UCAS equal consideration application deadline is 24 January 2024. If you need any guidance with your application, then our Admissions Team is here to help. You can also contact our Education Liaison Team for advice on how to craft the perfect personal statement.

Accountancy, Finance, and Economics

Understanding business operations at both a macro- and micro-level is crucial to the success of any company. Experts in accounting, finance, and economics perform this critical role, informing decisions at all levels of an organisation to ensure stability and success.

Industry Partnerships

We offer a range of courses in these areas, and our students are able to benefit from academic expertise and industry experience, taking advantage of the University's strong links with companies such as Siemens Energy, Santander, HSBC, and Deloitte.

Facilities

You will have access to key business software and facilities throughout your time here. This includes the Bloomberg Terminal, which is designed to help industry professionals make better-informed investment decisions by offering the latest market news along with historical data and an international network to communicate securely and reliably. You can also take part in the Lincoln Student Managed Investment Fund, which is operated and maintained by students and gives you the chance to gain real-world experience of the Stock Exchange.

Work Placement Year

Our programmes offer you the chance to take a yearlong work placement following your second year. This enables you to gain industry experience and apply your knowledge in a real business setting. You don't have to pay tuition fees for this year, but will need to cover travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Field Trips

You can also expand your horizons, visit our partner universities, and see international business in action by joining funded field trips to exciting overseas destinations. In recent years, students have visited India, Finland, the Czech Republic, the Netherlands, and the Republic of Ireland. Places are awarded competitively to eligible students each academic year. Please see our website for more information.

Our Courses

Our BA (Hons) Accountancy and Finance can help you to take on real-world challenges by applying critical thought in the accountancy and finance discipline. You are able to gain a solid understanding of accountancy and finance and critically reflect

on your learning, while developing the commercial awareness, problem-solving abilities, communication skills, and teamworking that are highly valued by employers. The course also explores key accounting and finance issues within the wider business context, and you can select from a range of options aligned to your own interests and career ambitions. The course features two pathways, with one offering exemptions from elements of the professional qualification for ACCA, CIMA, ICAEW, and AIA. We also offer a BA (Hons) International Accounting with Finance, which has been specifically designed to utilise a variety of assessment methods, with fewer examinations than some other programmes.

BSc (Hons) Banking and Finance encourages you to examine how the economy works, how business decisions are made, and how financial systems and capital markets operate in an international context. It is aimed at those aspiring for a career in a range of industry roles such as securities analyst, financial or investment manager, or as a private, commercial, or investment banker. You can explore the way government policies influence stock markets and prices, as well as how private and corporate wealth is created. The course looks at the foundations of economic principles, accounting and finance, and business data analysis, as well as the more advanced elements of financial and banking management.



Economics at Lincoln is ranked in the top 10 in the UK for student satisfaction in the Guardian University Guide 2023.



Our BA (Hons) Business and Finance introduces you to business and finance theory in a range of settings and from an international perspective, examining the importance of data analysis, legal knowledge, marketing, operations, and organisational behaviour. The course lays the foundation by introducing the key elements of business. More advanced and specialist subjects are covered later in the programme, when you will also be able to examine financial management at a higher level. The course currently offers a route to exemption from elements of examination for the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA). Students may be required to undertake specific modules to achieve this exemption.

If you are looking to develop the economic skills and problem-solving abilities needed to tackle the problems faced by today's business managers, then our **BA** (Hons) Business Economics can help you do just that. You'll explore business, industrial, macro-

economic, and international economic contexts from an economist's analytical perspective and have an opportunity to gain a solid grounding in economics, marketing, business finance, and law. The course is aimed at students who wish to study an economics degree, but who have not followed economics or mathematics at A Level, or its equivalent, and who are looking for a business-focused programme without a considerable mathematics component.

BSc (Hons) Economics aims to equip you with the tools and frameworks required to analyse economic issues, as well as the skills needed to explore and explain new trends as they emerge in the current economic environment. You are introduced to core micro, macro, and international economics with modules in econometric analysis that can help you develop expertise in the statistical techniques used to analyse and interpret economic data. Later, you study intermediate micro and macroeconomics, which



are prerequisites for the advanced modules you are able to take in the final year. From the outset, the course encourages you to develop the confidence to challenge established economic wisdom.

The University offers a joint honours degree BSc (Hons) Economics and Finance, which aims to develop the skills needed to analyse financial and economic events and their impact on markets. You can gain an understanding of advanced financial techniques, including pricing and portfolio management, and the course covers topics such as micro and macroeconomics, financial management, and econometrics. Teaching explores how financial management decisions can improve the performance and efficiency of organisations, and how capital markets operate theoretically and behaviourally. You can also learn how to interpret financial information, manipulate data using statistical software packages, and analyse contemporary economics issues.

Degree Preparation

For overseas students who don't meet our standard entry requirements and would like to develop their English language, academic study skills, and subject-specific knowledge required for degree-level courses, we offer a range of International Year One programmes. These have been designed to help you prepare for study at Lincoln. For more information, please visit www.lincoln.ac.uk/internationalcollege.



Architecture, Construction, and Interior Design

Taking an integrated approach that brings together architecture, construction, technology, and design, Lincoln's built environment courses aim to address today's growing need to design, build, and use our built environment socially, economically, and sustainably.

There is an emphasis on employability, and the Lincoln School of Architecture and the Built Environment has strong connections with relevant professional institutions and regional and national industry, including Foster + Partners, Bowmer and Kirkland, Influence Environmental, RPS, Waldeck, and Briggs Hillier. These can offer students

opportunities to get involved in placements, live projects, site visits, and industry events.

Specialist Facilities

You can benefit from industry-standard equipment and technologies, and have access to a range of bespoke spaces and facilities to develop your creative and practical skills. This includes computer suites of high-end PCs with CAD and BIM software, as well as specialist building simulation programmes. In addition to practical workshop spaces, equipment for land surveying, environmental monitoring, and thermal imaging is available in the specialist Construction Science Laboratory.

Our Courses

Our BArch (Hons) Architecture aims to prepare you for a career in the exciting field of architectural practice, placing an emphasis on design and creativity, and laying a strong foundation of cultural and technical knowledge. It blends theory with practice, with opportunities to work on a series of independent and collaborative projects to shape your learning around your interests. The course is validated by the Royal Institute of British Architects and prescribed by the Architects Registration Board as providing exemption from Part 1 examinations, which are required to register as an architect in the UK.

Lincoln's BSc (Hons) Construction Science and Management is accredited by the Chartered Institute of Building and aims to provide the technical knowledge and leadership skills needed for embracing a whole life-cycle perspective to construction project production. It comprises core elements including environmental science, construction technology, construction IT, and construction management. You can also explore further topics relating to areas such as the built environment context, law, economics, land surveying, and strategies for dealing with our existing building stock.

Learning through practice is a key element of BA (Hons) Design for Event, Exhibition and Performance, so you can expect to spend a lot of your time in a creative design studio environment. It's about creating 'storytelling spaces', and you may design brand experiences, exhibition projects for museums, visitor attractions and theme parks, commercial trade stands, and temporary environments for theatrical live events and festivals. There are opportunities to undertake projects that integrate aspects of spatial, interactive,

and graphic design to create engaging, narrative environments.

BA (Hons) Interior Architecture and Design

positions the subject between the academically rigorous profession of architecture and the fast-paced world of contemporary visual culture and design. Studio learning is enhanced by lectures and seminars on the social and historical context of architecture. Modules are presented in two streams: the design process and the research process. The design process incorporates conceptual, technical, and professional knowledge areas, while the research process stream focuses on design theory and contextual material. There are opportunities to gain practical work experience for real clients and building developments, including placements with a wide range of interior design and architectural practices.



Art and Design

At Lincoln, you can explore art and design in an engaging and supportive environment. learning from, and working alongside. academics who are experienced practitioners and industry professionals. Our College of Arts provides an exciting and collaborative environment where you can experiment with different media to hone your creative voice and develop vour unique visionary style.

Facilities

We offer extensive facilities including workshops for 3D fabrication, sculpture, fashion, and printmaking. You will have regular access to dedicated studio space. computer suites, and industry-standard equipment, staffed by highly knowledgeable technicians. Our MakerLab is a specialist facility for working with ceramics, glass, and precious metals, while the multimaterials workshops allow fabrication in a range of materials, including woods, metals, and plastics. In addition, there is a professional photography studio and darkrooms, digital fabric printing, and digital technologies featuring laser cutting, 3D printing, and VR. The Project Space Plus gallery provides a vibrant programme of curated exhibitions with opportunities for staff and students to test work in progress with a public audience.

A Creative Community

The University is working in partnership with Lincolnshire Co-op on the Barbican Creative Hub project, which will see one of Lincoln's iconic buildings reopen as a creative community space providing workspaces and a gallery for local artists and designers.

Student Awards

Our students regularly achieve industry recognition through RSA Student Design Awards, YCN Student Awards, Adobe Design Achievement Awards, Creative Conscience Awards, D&AD New Blood Awards, and in the International Taylor Wessing Photography Portrait prize.

Our Courses

Our BA (Hons) Creative Advertising can show you how to develop original ideas, bring them to life in the most compelling way, and use your creativity to change the way people think. You can

explore conceptual thinking, copywriting, and design, which can help you develop an understanding of the integrated nature of effective advertising. The course has long-standing relationships with some of the world's biggest advertising agencies, such as VCCP, Grey, Leo Burnett, Saatchi & Saatchi, and Ogilvy.

BA (Hons) Fashion focuses on the essential partnership between innovative design and technical excellence, and is continually looking out for audacious creative thinkers with the precision and craft to match. During the programme, you'll explore tailoring and pattern cutting (including zero-waste approaches), creative materiality, embellishment, digital fabric printing and digital fashion visualisation, and animation, blending traditional making with the digital literacy required to bring your boldest visions to life. We also embed sustainable approaches across all areas of professional practice.

BA (Hons) Fine Art emphasises individual creativity and introduces many fields of contemporary art, including live art, installation, and digital media, alongside the more traditional disciplines of painting, sculpture, drawing, and printmaking. You'll have the opportunity to work both within and beyond a dynamic studio culture, creating art for galleries and off-site spaces. You'll be encouraged to experiment with and explore a variety of techniques to help you develop a professional arts practice and open up a range of employment opportunities. The course culminates in the degree show exhibition where you'll have the opportunity to produce a major body of work for public exhibition.

Graphic designers are valued for their ability to tell compelling visual stories and play a key role in everything from branding and packaging to filmmaking, animation, and book design. On the BA (Hons) Graphic Design, you'll have the opportunity to develop a mix of practical design skills and creative insights, which can help you to become a visual communicator who solves problems in imaginative new ways. As the course progresses, you can develop your own interests and specialisms through a range of projects, some of which will be set by industry.

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Our BA (Hons) Illustration values and fosters craft, versatility, and imagination through a creative studio environment. During the programme, you can learn the techniques of your craft and be shown new ways to bring your ideas to life and tell remarkable stories through your illustrations. Through an experimental approach to learning, you are able to develop visual

and conceptual skills through drawing, painting, printmaking, and collage, as well as associated digital design, illustration, and creative thinking processes. This can help you to become a captivating visual communicator, developing your own unique approach to illustration, and engaging with collaborative industryled briefs and live projects.

Photography plays a significant role in the way we interpret our societies and surroundings. On the BA (Hons) Photography, you'll have the opportunity to gain experience in an environment that is adaptive, creative, and inspiring. This innovative programme has a distinctive and fluid approach that embodies the visual media within a contemporary context. You are offered a choice of pathways within lens-based media, including still, moving, digital, and analogue, responding to the changing nature of photography. Our students produce work for exhibitions, self-published books, competitions, and social media.



BA (Hons) Product Design is for those who aspire to become creative and responsible designers. Product designers can make a significant contribution to resolving the world's societal and environmental global challenges and addressing the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. You can develop an understanding of product design based on creative methodologies, technical knowledge, and the acquisition of design skills. Working sustainably and responsibly with new and emerging technologies, you are able to create innovative products and have opportunities to explore new and emerging areas of practice, including service design, social innovation, health and wellbeing, and user experience (UX) and user interface (UI) design.

Biological and Life Sciences

Life scientists play a critical role in developing our understanding of the anatomy, physiology, and biochemistry of humans, animals, plants, and other living organisms, to better understand how they function and interact with each other and the world around us.

At Lincoln, our undergraduate programmes span the breadth of the life sciences and teaching is underpinned by the research expertise of our academic staff, a number of whom are at the forefront of their respective fields, such as Professor Daniel Mills, a world-renowned authority on the human-animal bond, and Professor Claire Hills, a leading specialist in chronic kidney disease.

Facilities

You can study in modern, well-equipped laboratories in the University's Janet Lane-Claypon Building and Joseph Banks Laboratories, as well as in Minster House, which provides specialist laboratories for animal cognition, behaviour, and welfare, including an insectary and a bioacoustics laboratory.

Field Trips

All of our programmes offer the chance to take part in an optional overseas field trip in the third year to study plants and animals in the wild. Destinations may vary, but have previously included the cloud forests of Ecuador, the Mankwe Wildlife Reserve in South Africa, and Molise in Italy. Optional field trips may incur additional costs. Please see our website for more information.

Science Foundation Year

Our Courses


Our BSc (Hons) Animal Behaviour and Welfare aims to help you develop the knowledge and skills needed to understand animal behaviour and welfare in the context of companion animal, farm, zoo, and laboratory environments. You can gain a solid foundation in animal anatomy and physiology, cell biology, genetics, captive animal management, and

animal behaviour. These themes are developed further through the study of specialist subjects dealing with animal behaviour, health, and disease. Later in the programme, core modules focus on pure and applied aspects of animal behaviour and welfare. Our four-year integrated Master's programme, MBio Animal Behaviour and Welfare, includes an additional research-intensive final year, which may lead to further research and employment opportunities.

BSc (Hons) Biochemistry offers an understanding of the biological and chemical processes that allow life to thrive, by examining the chemistry of life at a molecular level. You are introduced to a variety of topics including molecular biology, immunology, pharmacology, and biotechnology. Early in the degree, you are able to study a breadth of core topics, including biochemistry, physiology, genetics, and cell biology. These are built upon as the course progresses, where you can add specialisms to your degree. We also offer the MBio Biochemistry, which features a research-intensive final year following the three-year undergraduate degree.

BSc (Hons) Biology at Lincoln covers a diverse range of subject areas which explore the structure, function, growth, origin, evolution, and distribution of living organisms. You can study the many facets of biology, develop an understanding of research methods, apply your learning in the laboratory and in the field, and develop your own specialisms. You are introduced to the different elements of biology, including evolution, ecology, metabolism, microbial biochemistry, and genetics. Later, you can study a range of topics including molecular biology, animal health and disease, immunology, and conservation biology, alongside training in data handling and analysis. An MBio Biology is available for those wanting to take an additional Master's-level year and develop additional research skills and techniques.

Our BSc (Hons) Biomedical Science is accredited by the Institute of Biomedical Science and offers a broad scientific base. The course emphasises the development of transferable skills in information retrieval, data analysis, problem solving, and critical thinking, as well as hands-on experience. It introduces fundamentals such as human anatomy and physiology, genetics, and human health and disease, before progressing to topics including pharmacology, immunology, and molecular biology. Later, you can choose to explore topics such as cancer, transfusion, and the latest cutting-edge treatments. The four-year integrated Master's MBio Biomedical Science offers an additional research-intensive year where you can develop key analytical and research skills while undertaking a specialist project.

An exploration of the biological processes that underlie animal health and disease is the focus of **BSc (Hons) Bioveterinary Science**. The degree combines key concepts in animal science with relevant laboratory,

field, and computer analysis. It introduces you to the processes surrounding animal health, including life histories of pathogens and parasites, infection and immunity, preventative measures, diagnosis, and treatments. You can pursue individual interests within a range of topics including animal behaviour, protection, toxicology, and clinical biochemistry. Later, you can undertake an individual research project and choose further optional modules. In addition to the BSc programme, the University also offers the MBio Bioveterinary Science, an integrated four-year Master's programme focusing on specialist research.

BSc (Hons) Ecology and Conservation seeks to explore the natural world, from individuals to populations, and communities to ecosystems. You are able to examine how organisms interact with each other and their environment, and how these processes are affected by human activities. The degree is designed to provide a broad understanding of the core aspects of ecology

and conservation and emphasises gaining practical skills in the field and laboratory. Modules are designed to develop a sound knowledge of key biological and environmental concepts, progressing to more specialist modules later in the programme. A four-year integrated Master's programme, MBio Ecology and Conservation, aims to develop the core research skills and techniques in the subject further.

BSc (Hons) Zoology at Lincoln is designed to develop a broad understanding of animals living in their natural environments and encompasses the study of key aspects of modern zoology in a diverse range of vertebrates and invertebrates. You can develop a sound knowledge of core biological concepts, including genetics, evolution, and ecology, and specialise in animal anatomy, physiology, and behaviour. MBio Zoology includes an additional research-intensive year, offering modules that can help you to develop key transferable skills.

Business

Innovation, creativity, entrepreneurship, and sustainable management are crucial elements in today's fast-paced business world. All sectors need graduates with this broad knowledge base and the skills to embrace opportunities and devise effective solutions to the ongoing challenges faced by organisations, both large and small, in the UK and abroad.

Industry Partnerships

The University of Lincoln has built a reputation for understanding and responding to the needs of business. We are proud of our innovative industry partnerships with a whole range of organisations, representatives of which share their expertise and knowledge with our staff and students through conferences, masterclasses, visits, and placement opportunities. We are also a member of AACSB, a global non-profit association connecting educators. students, and businesses to achieve a common goal, which is to create the next generation of great leaders.

Lincoln International Business School works with students and organisations to enhance the contribution of business to society. For students, that means developing the business skills and knowledge needed to improve their career readiness.

Work Placement Year

Our programmes offer you the chance to take a yearlong work placement following your second year. This enables you to gain industry experience and apply your knowledge in a real business setting. You don't have to pay tuition fees for this year, but will need to cover travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Field Trips

As a Lincoln International Business School student, you can also expand your horizons, visit our partner universities, and see international business in action by joining funded field trips to exciting overseas destinations. In recent years, students have visited India, Finland, the Czech Republic, the Netherlands, and the Republic of Ireland. Places are awarded competitively to eligible students each academic year. Our Courses

BA (Hons) Business offers you the opportunity to develop the critical-thinking, problem-solving, and analytical skills needed to enter the competitive world of business. The course takes an international perspective and introduces key elements of business, including economics, finance, marketing, entrepreneurship, and operations. The programme also features a range of modules designed to develop professional skills in operations management, consumer behaviour, and innovation. You can take your business knowledge further and develop a career specialism by choosing the subject areas aligned to your personal interests.

Our BA (Hons) Business and Management, which is currently accredited by the Chartered Management Institute, encourages you to think and act as a manager, develop your critical-thinking skills, and build a broad knowledge of core business subject areas for potential careers in private, public, or third sector organisations. You'll tackle subjects which underpin business practice, such as finance, organisational behaviour, and economics, before moving on to more complex aspects of management, including sustainability, leadership, innovation, operations, and budgeting. Later, the course allows you to explore areas such as ethics, crisis management, financial management, and global marketing strategy.

Our BA (Hons) Business and Marketing offers you the chance to explore the academic and practical context of business and develop a marketing specialism. Core business concepts are examined and built on throughout the degree. You will also be introduced to the tools needed to develop successful strategies and business campaigns. The course content acknowledges the importance of digital marketing, offering you the opportunity to develop digital skills from the outset. You can choose from a wide range of business modules later in the programme to reflect your own personal interests and ambitions. The course is currently accredited by the Chartered Institute of Marketing.

If you are looking to develop the economic skills and problem-solving abilities needed to tackle the problems faced by today's business managers, then our **BA** (**Hons**) **Business Economics** can help you

do just that. You'll explore business, industrial, macroeconomic, and international economic contexts from an economist's analytical perspective and have an opportunity to gain a solid grounding in economics, marketing, business finance, and law. The course is aimed at students who wish to study an economics degree, but who have not followed economics or mathematics at A Level, or its equivalent, and who are looking for a business-focused programme without a considerable mathematics component.

Designed for students whose first language is not English, **BA** (Hons) Business with English explores a range of business topics. It can help you develop the skills needed to work for a business operating in a global context, enhancing critical and intellectual capabilities and an awareness of changing environments. The course's broad curriculum is

relevant for many international careers, promoting and encouraging continued personal and professional development through lifelong learning. You are able to gain knowledge, understanding, and capability in key business functions, and you can study English language modules designed to develop skills in both communication and negotiation. Please note that the work placement year is not available with this course.

Our BA (Hons) Business with Entrepreneurship

gives you the opportunity to learn about business management and theory to help you start your own business or acquire key employability skills. You can study business law, ethical and socially responsible entrepreneurship, the principles of business and operational management, e-business, and marketing. You are encouraged to work in a creative and strategic way to develop a business plan by yourself or with a group of fellow students, formulating ideas and starting up your own business. Students can utilise the University's on-campus business incubation centre, Sparkhouse (subject to availability), which offers a range of resources and facilities for start-ups along with opportunities to share knowledge and ideas with other entrepreneurs.

Degree Preparation

For overseas students who don't meet our standard entry requirements and would like to develop their English language, academic study skills, and subject-specific knowledge required for degree-level courses, we offer a range of International Year One programmes. Chemistry and Forensic Science

Concerned with the study of matter, its properties and reactions, chemistry is pivotal in tackling global challenges such as energy production, health and wellbeing, food security, and the use of natural resources.

At Lincoln, we integrate core chemistry disciplines with advanced topics aligned to the major scientific challenges of the 21st Century. These include nanoscience for new materials and devices, the chemistry-biology interface for drugs discovery, nuclear chemistry for safe energy generation, biotechnology for new manufacturing methods, and sensors for forensic medical and environmental applications.

Specialist Facilities

Our students have access to the University's Joseph Banks Laboratories and Janet Lane-Claypon Building, which offer specialist laboratory and teaching spaces. High-specification equipment is available for nuclear magnetic resonance, mass spectrometry, chromatography, electron microscopy, and X-ray diffraction.

Accreditation

Our BSc (Hons)/MChem Chemistry and BSc (Hons)/MChem Forensic Chemistry programmes are accredited by the Royal Society of Chemistry.
Our BSc (Hons) Forensic Science is accredited by the Chartered Society of Forensic Sciences.

Our Courses

Our BSc (Hons) and MChem Chemistry take an innovative, integrated approach to organic, inorganic, and physical chemistry. Challenges based on industry-led, interdisciplinary projects are undertaken throughout the programme, and laboratory workshops and extensive use of specialist equipment provide the chance for you to develop hands-on skills. Later in the course, you can apply your experience to a range of real-world applications, including sector-relevant, interdisciplinary projects.

Our BSc (Hons) and MChem Chemistry for Drug Discovery and Development can help you gain skills in the design and development of new drug treatments, from building active molecules all the way through to producing the final pharmaceutical products that become available to patients. You have the opportunity to develop your knowledge of synthetic chemistry and gain experience in drug formulation and manufacture within the regulatory context of the pharmaceutical industry. This will involve practical experience of advanced laboratory techniques.

In addition to our pure chemistry programmes, the University of Lincoln also offers two joint honours degrees combining the discipline with education and mathematics.

BSc (Hons) and MChem Chemistry with Education offer a thorough grounding in chemistry along with the intellectual and research skills needed for a career in teaching. This course aims to develop students with the skills needed to teach the next generation about the fundamental importance of chemistry, and has been developed in collaboration with the University's School of Education. As part of the degree, there may be the chance to undertake a teaching placement with a local school.

BSc (Hons) and MChem Chemistry with Mathematics integrate these fundamental subjects. providing you with the chance to examine the relationship between the disciplines and the important roles they play in different contexts. You are able to develop your knowledge and understanding of chemistry alongside training in practical chemistry and mathematics. The course covers core chemistry subjects, which include synthetic methodologies and molecular characterisation; laboratory techniques; molecular structure, bonding and mechanism: and electronic structure and spectroscopy. In the mathematics element, students are given the opportunity to gain knowledge in a variety of subjects, including programming, computation, and data analysis.

BSc (Hons) and MChem Forensic Chemistry provide you with the chance to develop the skills of a professional forensic chemist, including laboratory

examination, report writing, crime scene analysis, and courtroom presentation. With a broad spectrum of modules, it is possible to specialise in areas such as DNA analysis, biological chemistry, and nuclear forensics. The course offers a solid foundation in chemistry, including laboratory work, and the principles of forensic science and crime scene investigation. Later, you can explore advanced aspects of forensic chemistry and are introduced to key areas of advanced crime scene methods and trace evidence.

Forensic scientists work in laboratories, at crime scenes, and in courtrooms, utilising their biology and chemistry expertise. Our **BSc (Hons) Forensic Science** is designed to help you develop the skills and knowledge required in order to apply scientific expertise in criminal investigations. The course explores a range of forensic science functions, including crime scene investigation, physical evidence collection, sample analysis, and defence of testimony.



It combines a broad spectrum of subjects, such as advanced chemical and biological analysis, forensic toxicology, and crime scene management. This programme also has full accreditation from the Chartered Society of Forensic Sciences, meaning that students are eligible for associate membership. An optional overseas field trip gives students the opportunity to experience first-hand the work of a forensic specialist. Previous destinations have included Guatemala, the USA, and Canada. Students who choose to participate are required to pay for their own flights and general living costs. Accommodation is provided by the University.

Computer Science

Society is in the midst of a digital revolution; from the smart devices we use to navigate our daily lives to the advances in artificial intelligence which are transforming global industries.

Specialist Facilities

Lincoln's computer science programmes focus on cutting-edge topics, such as artificial intelligence, virtual and augmented reality, and machine learning, in addition to core computer science disciplines. Students can access computer laboratories with highperformance workstations, and a range of equipment, including Raspberry Pi devices, robots, and virtual reality equipment such as HTC Vive and Oculus Quest.

Accreditation

BSc (Hons)/MComp Computer Science, and BSc (Hons)/MComp Games Computing are accredited by BCS. The Chartered Institute for IT, and the University of Lincoln is affiliated with the Institution of Analysts and Programmers. Lincoln's School of Computer Science is a member of the Microsoft Imagine Academy and Cisco Academy, which offer industry-recognised qualifications such as Microsoft Technology Associate and Cisco certification.

Our Courses

BSc (Hons) and MComp Computer Science are designed to provide a broad foundation in computer science and develop the mathematical, analytical, and problem-solving skills required to succeed in the

modern computing industry. They cover digital technologies such as big data, cloud computing, artificial intelligence, and robotics, which are currently driving advances in all aspects of the modern world, as well as specialist areas including autonomous mobile robotics, logic and computation, crossplatform development, or cyber security.

BSc (Hons) Computer Science with Artificial Intelligence combines the study of computer science with a focus on artificial intelligence — an exciting area concerned with building smart machines capable of performing tasks that typically require human intelligence. It allows you to develop your knowledge and practice in areas such as natural language processing, nature-inspired computing, deep learning and its applications, and the ethics of artificial intelligence systems.

Keeping pace with one of the world's largest entertainment industries, Lincoln's BSc (Hons) and MComp Games Computing aim to develop versatile professionals with the digital skills to thrive in the multi-billion-pound video games sector, enabling vou to adapt to evolving technology and contribute to organisations at the forefront of those advances. Beyond learning how to develop software, you can examine the interaction between the computer and its user, and how to design an engaging experience.

Our BSc (Hons) Games Computing with Virtual and Augmented Reality gives you the opportunity to combine your study of games computing with a focus on the game technologies of the future. By blending core computer science and game development skills with a focus on extended reality, interaction, immersiveness, and entertainment, the course aims to create developers who are equipped to address the increasing demand for extended reality as a platform for game technologies.

Robotics is an interdisciplinary area of computer science and engineering dedicated to the design. construction, and control of intelligent mechanical devices. Our BSc (Hons) Robotics focuses on innovative project-based learning and aims to provide a strong conceptual and methodological grounding in robotics, while offering training in state-of-the-art practices and techniques. The programme nurtures your intellectual curiosity and problem-solving skills, inspiring the next generation of robotics specialists to develop innovative solutions to real-world problems.

Criminology

Criminologists use theory to explore some of the most contentious issues in contemporary society, working to understand the causes of crime and the ways in which criminal justice agencies respond to offenders.

Lincoln's criminology programmes offer an in-depth look at modern crime, punishment, prevention, and the impact that crime has on society. They allow you to explore the motivations that lead people to commit crimes, alongside the context of policies and the systems that can be used to prevent law-breaking.

Expertise

Our research-active academics contribute to national policy debates and will encourage you to engage with key issues in the study of crime and criminal justice. They work closely with local criminal justice agencies and professionals, who regularly visit the University to give guest lectures and collaborate with staff and students on a range of projects.

Work Placement

You may have the opportunity to gain experience of a professional policy environment during a voluntary work placement with a local council. Here you'll be able to observe how policy is set by central government and executed by local authorities. Those who undertake a work placement are responsible for covering their travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Study Abroad

To see your subject from a different perspective, you'll have the option to apply for a study abroad year at one of our partner institutions in the USA, Sweden, Belgium, Germany, or the Netherlands. This usually takes place between the second and third years of study, with places allocated competitively. You won't need to pay a tuition fee to either the University or your host university, but you will need to cover general costs, including visa, accommodation, and other living expenses.

Our Courses

Criminologists look to understand why people commit crimes they do, and how to reduce offender behaviour. Our BA (Hons) Criminology aims to provide you with the tools needed to investigate these issues and the effects of crime in contemporary society. You can also develop the knowledge and skills required to understand and explain other key aspects, such as criminalisation, criminal justice, criminality, and harm. You can choose from a range of optional modules, allowing you to tailor your studies to your career aspirations or areas of interest. Topics include policing, youth justice, and green criminology. Students are taught by a research-active academic team, whose specialisms include violence, extremism, and drug offences.

Lincoln also offers two joint honours degree programmes that combine criminology with the fields of social policy and sociology.

Lincoln's BA (Hons) Criminology and Social Policy enables you to explore the causes and prevention of crime while examining how social policy is developed. During your first year, you can gain a solid knowledge base by examining crime scene images, key social science concepts, social issues, and the application of research skills to social problems. You can select from a range of optional modules, depending on

your career goals and aspirations, and learning is strengthened with an in-depth look at punishment theory and policies, community, and policy making.

BA (Hons) Criminology and Sociology aims to develop the skills and knowledge you will need to effectively evaluate social, cultural, and political responses to crime. There are opportunities to hone these skills in independent learning, research, and analysis. As the course progresses, you can shape your learning to suit your own interests by selecting from optional modules that span the breadth of the fields of sociology, criminology, social policy, and politics. You'll also be able to develop an understanding of the theories, practice, and history of punishment.

Education

Educators have the power to inspire our younger generations. They help children and young people gain the knowledge and skills needed for their futures, both in and outside of the classroom.

Our range of education programmes is delivered by passionate and research-active staff, many of whom are practitioners within the field. Our degrees aim to develop confident graduates who can understand and question current and historical education systems, alongside an ability to shape and transform the way people learn. Once you graduate, you'll be well-placed to move onto a primary PGCE teacher training course, or you could also consider working as an educator across a range of related sectors.

Research

Throughout your studies, you'll be encouraged to make the most of research-based opportunities that will help you gain the knowledge and skills needed to work in the sector. Our academic team can help you undertake a small-scale research project in an area of vour choice.

Work Experience

You can build your confidence in the classroom by undertaking work experience during your studies. The University's dedicated Work Opportunities Hub can help you find a suitable setting, and provide support and guidance on what's available within the UK. The University's College of Social Science works with a dedicated Placement Officer to support students

in setting up placements. You'll need to cover your own travel, accommodation, and general living costs during any work experience.

Study Abroad

To help you develop a deeper understanding of your subject area through a different viewpoint, there's the chance to undertake a study trip abroad. These trips aim to provide an in-depth exploration of the way different education systems are delivered overseas. Please note, you will need to cover your own travel. accommodation, and general living costs during such trips.

Our Courses

BA (Hons) Education provides an overview of educational delivery methods and how children and young people learn. You can examine core themes of education and research skills, while investigating different learning environments across the world. Later in the programme, you'll be able to focus on special educational needs and diversity, research methods, and perspectives in education. You will also be able to tailor your degree to suit your interests by selecting from a variety of optional modules that include digital education, childhood studies, and the psychology of education.

The University also offers two honours degree programmes that combine the discipline with digital learning and psychology.

Our BSc (Hons) Education and Digital Learning

aims to develop your understanding of teaching and learning, and the way technology can be used within the field to help you become a digitally trained education professional who can innovate and adapt to the rapidly changing demands of education. You'll be able to explore new approaches to digital education by accessing a range of technologies provided by the University of Lincoln.

BSc (Hons) Education and Psychology uses the application of psychology to help support a broader understanding of education. You can investigate the cognitive capacity of humans and explore how the brain develops and affects a person's learning ability. You'll be able to develop and refine your research skills and tailor the course depending on your intended career path by choosing from a range of optional modules. After graduating, you'll be well placed to work in the education sector or could even consider a career as an academic researcher.

Engineering

Engineers provide the critical link between scientific discovery and the practical application of knowledge, which is helping to meet the needs of business and society.

The engineering degree programmes at Lincoln are designed to be modern and innovative in order to equip our graduates with the knowledge, skills, and competencies needed to pursue their ambitions and have successful and sustained careers in this dynamic field.

Industry Links

Founded in partnership with Siemens and now progressing with Siemens Energy, Lincoln's School

of Engineering has a core philosophy of researchled teaching, and our links with Siemens Energy offer Lincoln graduates enhanced opportunities for mentoring and recruitment. Informed by the needs of industry, our programmes aim to prepare students to make an immediate contribution upon entering the workplace.

Specialist Facilities

Students are based in the University's Isaac Newton Building, which offers access to facilities including workshops and computer laboratories, an electrical systems laboratory, and a biofuels laboratory. It also houses industry-standard machinery, turbines, and additional teaching and research laboratories.

Science Foundation Year

Our engineering programmes are available with a Science Foundation Year or International Foundation Year, designed to open up a pathway of study to those who may not meet the standard entry requirements. For more information, please visit our website at www.lincoln.ac.uk/course/sfysfyub/.

Our Courses

Our BEng (Hons) Biomedical Engineering combines biology and engineering, applying engineering principles and materials to medicine and healthcare. You can study the foundations of engineering principles, human anatomy, and the physiology of the human body. Topics include digital prosthetics, biomedical robots for personal care, medical implants, medical imaging, medical ethics, clinical trials, and regulations. Project-based learning is a key part of the programme and you will have the opportunity to undertake team-based engineering projects.

Our BEng (Hons) and MEng (Hons) Electrical and Electronic Engineering cover core electrical engineering subjects and provide opportunities to specialise in advanced electronics. They are accredited by the Institution of Engineering and Technology and offer a foundation in engineering theory and practice. You can develop fundamental knowledge in areas such as robotics; semiconductor device physics; electrical technology; matter and interactions; engineering mathematics; and numerical computation.

BEng (Hons) and MEng (Hons) Mechanical Engineering aim to produce industry-ready graduates who are highly skilled, creative engineers, able to adapt to new challenges. These programmes are accredited by the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and provide a foundation in engineering theory and practice. Specialist topics include engineering mechanics; computing and programming for engineers; materials and methods of manufacture; combustion, fuels, and energy; and new and

sustainable product design.

Our BEng (Hons) Mechatronics combines skills from the fields of mechanical and electrical engineering and aims to produce engineers who can actively participate in and manage the executive design and development of mechatronic systems. Key topics include electrical and electronic technology, engineering mechanics, and robotics and automation. This programme is accredited by the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and offers flexibility to promote a large variety of possible industry applications.

Graduate opportunities for placements, mentoring, and recruitment are underpinned by close industrial links, including with Siemens Energy.

English and Creative Writing

Words are powerful. We learn about the world through stories, of one form or another, and an English degree can help us to interpret the complex cultural, political, and ideological spaces in which we live.

At Lincoln, you can learn from published authors and internationally recognised experts to explore a varied selection of artists, from Chaucer to Zadie Smith. Our English, history, and creative writing academics are engaged in research which directly informs their teaching. You may also benefit from the experience of a range of writers, editors, dramaturges, producers, and directors who visit the University, such as former Poet Laureate Dame Carol Ann Duffy, who is a

Visiting Artist at the University and shares readings and takes part in workshops with students.

Facilities

To support your studies, you'll have access to thousands of books, ebooks, print and electronic journals, as well as databases and specialist collections in the University's Great Central Warehouse Library. You can also access a range of cultural resources in the city of Lincoln, such as the works of Tennyson at the Tennyson Research Centre. Our partnership with Lincoln Cathedral gives students access to its libraries, which house a remarkable collection of medieval manuscripts and rare books, including a manuscript of *The Canterbury Tales*.

Our Courses

If you love to read and write and want to explore your own creativity, our **BA** (Hons) Creative Writing aims to help you develop your writing in innovative and exciting ways. As well as discovering your own voice, you'll have the opportunity to work with leading authors, playwrights, and poets, to practise a range of techniques in order to develop a portfolio of work across an array of forms and styles. The course has a strong focus on employability and aims to prepare you for a professional writing or publishing career.

BA (Hons) English enables you to consider literature within a variety of academic, historical, and cultural contexts. Your studies will introduce narrative, poetry, drama, popular culture, literary history, and literary criticism. As the course progresses, you can choose from a wide range of modules and there is the option to study abroad for one term. Please note, you will be responsible for your own travel, accommodation, and general living costs if you choose the study abroad option. Later in the programme, you'll have the chance to pursue specialist subjects or author-focused topics and undertake a dissertation on a research topic of your choice, supervised by a recognised scholar in your chosen field.

Study world literature, explore your talents, and build a solid technical foundation as a writer with **BA** (Hons) English and Creative Writing. During the course, you'll be able to explore the various approaches to creative writing through the close reading of major contemporary authors, examining their techniques and applying them to the production of original, imaginative work. A wide range of optional modules enables you to pursue areas of particular interest and develop your portfolio while engaging in individual research.

BA (Hons) English and History invites you to analyse a range of literary approaches from the medieval period to the 21st Century, while exploring questions about the past in order to better understand and interpret the world around you. Dividing your time between these two closely related fields, you'll be able to study a broad range of writers, taking a global approach to the study of literature. Previous study trips have included visits to Newstead Abbey, former home of the poet Lord Byron, and Shakespeare's Globe Theatre in London. There may be additional costs associated with study visits. Film and Media

The media have never been more relevant. They form a ubiquitous and inextricable part of our everyday lives, holding an unprecedented power to drive opinions, debates, and movements.

Lincoln's industry-focused film and media courses are designed to help you become an imaginative, creative, and culturally aware 21st Century media practitioner, with a thorough understanding of the creative industries and the ability to analyse and challenge media conventions. They enable you to find your own creative voice in whichever field you are most passionate, while gaining important hands-on experience for your future career.

Equipment and Facilities

You'll have access to a range of specialist facilities and equipment depending on the course you've chosen. There are audio and video editing suites; digital imaging, design, and multimedia suites; darkrooms and photography studios fully fitted with electronic flash lighting; a sound dubbing theatre with foley room; a high-end post-production finishing suite with Flame software; a writers' room; production offices; and a 20-seat 4K screening room.

The University provides access to a range of professional media equipment, including an Arri Alexa Plus 4:3 camera system and industry-standard lighting such as Aputure to enable you to film and record on location. Software includes Avid Media Composer, Da Vinci Resolve, and Adobe Creative Cloud.

Students are also able to utilise a wealth of material in the campus-based Media Archive for Central England, a specialist regional public film archive, supplementing resources available in the University's library.

Student Success



Our Courses

Lincoln's BA (Hons) Animation and Visual Effects enables you to develop into a creative animator or artist with the flexibility to practise your craft in a variety of media. It covers a range of skills, including the fundamentals of animation, storytelling, performance, design, drawing, 3D modelling, 2D and computer-generated animation, compositing. animation theory, and the production of short films. Life drawing forms an integral part of the programme, combined with developing narrative, character design, and classic animation principles and techniques.

BA (Hons) Film and Television Studies is a

theory-orientated critical studies degree, enhanced by opportunities for creative and professional development. It can help you deepen your understanding of the core issues and key concepts of the discipline, providing an overview of the theory, history, and analysis of film and television. Optional modules allow you to forge your own path according to your research and creative interests.



Lincoln graduates have worked on blockbuster films including Star Wars: The Last Jedi, Spectre, and Ready Player One. They have also worked on TV programmes including Gogglebox and Blue Planet II.



BA (Hons) Film Production is designed to develop the next generation of innovative film-makers, offering you the chance to gain extensive experience in all areas of the film production process, working with contemporary industry-standard facilities, equipment, and software. It introduces a range of skills in directing, producing, screenwriting, cinematography, sound recording, and editing, while allowing you to develop an understanding of film theories and explore film-making through a variety of projects.

BA (Hons) Media Production offers a comprehensive experience across the many platforms of today's creative sector, including TV and screen, emergent digital media and design, radio, and sound. It blends theory with practice, exploring techniques and craft in a range of areas, including film production, digital media and innovative design, sound, multi-camera studio, image creation, social media, podcasting,

games, script, and screenwriting, as well as newer forms of media, such as augmented reality and virtual production. You can work on live project briefs and gain hands-on experience to develop as a creative media practitioner.

If you would prefer a critical studies programme that interrogates the transformative role of media in contemporary digital culture, our BA (Hons) Media **Studies** may be of interest. It includes everyday uses of social media, mobile apps, and networked devices that foster user-generated content across a variety of contexts, as well as addressing how traditional media, such as film and television, have been transformed by digital processes. The programme introduces seminal perspectives and new directions in media studies, audio-visual practice skills, visuality and aesthetics, digital and auditory cultures, and the practices of gaming.

Photography plays a significant role in the way we interpret our societies and surroundings. On the BA (Hons) Photography, you'll have the opportunity to gain experience in an environment that is adaptive. creative, and inspiring. This innovative programme has a distinctive and fluid approach that embodies the visual media within a contemporary context. You are offered a choice of pathways within lens-based media, including still, moving, digital, and analogue, responding to the changing nature of photography. Our students produce work for exhibitions, self-published books, competitions, and social media.

Underpinned by critical studies and research, and with an emphasis on collaboration and handson experience, our BA (Hons) Sound and Music **Production** is designed to nurture experimentation and creativity. You can learn a variety of practical skills in areas including sound design for film. TV, animation, and games; radio production; and music production, and benefit from the University's established links with industry, including the BBC and Abbey Road Studios. You will be encouraged to work on paid commissions from external clients in order to develop your own CV and portfolio.

Arts Foundation Year

The Arts Foundation Year provides an alternative entry route into some of our creative degree-level programmes. You'll have the opportunity to explore your creativity, developing the techniques and confidence that can turn your imagination into a

rewarding career path. As the first year of a four-year learning journey, it suits students who are unsure of their creative direction, need time to adjust to degree-level study, or do not meet standard entry requirements. Geography

Environmental change, sustainability, and the relationship between human society and planet Earth are some of the most important issues facing us today.

Lincoln's Geography courses encourage you to explore these topics and to develop the analytical, critical, and collaborative skills that can be applied to some of the key global challenges of the 21st Century. You are able to work on real-world problems, equipping you with the skills and knowledge needed to take on these challenges.

Expertise

A belief in the importance of interdisciplinary knowledge to address major issues is at the heart of

our approach. Lincoln's academics are experienced researchers investigating key issues in global development across a spectrum of human and physical geography. Researchers include Professor of Climate Science and Meteorology, Edward Hanna, who has led a major research project into improving seasonal weather prediction, exploring interactions between climate change and extreme weather.

Fieldwork

We believe fieldwork is core to the study of geography and we provide many fieldwork opportunities for our students. Extensive projects and fieldwork in the UK and overseas support the development of core skills in gathering, collating, and analysing data. Destinations have previously included the Lincolnshire coast, Chile, and the Greek island of Crete. Optional field trips may incur additional costs. Please see our website for more information.

Work Placements

We provide credited placements as part of our degrees, and there are chances to work with industry partners, schools, and public organisations. These take place during the second and third years of study, alongside the option to take a placement year between the second and third years. The University's Department of Geography works with a dedicated Placement Officer to support you in setting up placement opportunities. When undertaking optional placements in the UK or overseas, or when studying abroad, you will be responsible for your own travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Our Courses

The University offers a BA (Hons) and BSc (Hons) Geography which follow a common first year. The courses have a central thread of concept lectures, seminars, small group tutorials, group project work, and practical teaching of analytical skills through field and laboratory classes. A series of core modules are designed to integrate both physical and human geography skills and concepts, which aims to provide a foundation for students to become 'geographers' in the true, interdisciplinary sense.

In the second and third years, students taking BA (Hons) Geography will follow a route that centres around human geography, while BSc (Hons) Geography students will focus on physical geography. Both years comprise a mixture of core modules covering research skills, laboratory techniques, fieldwork, and modelling, in addition to a range of optional modules in specialist topics. The courses are

accredited by the Royal Geographical Society with the Institute of British Geographers.

The University also offers four-year MGeog Human Geography and MGeog Physical Geography courses, designed for those seeking to develop their analytical and research skills further and increase their knowledge and expertise in a particular area of geography. These programmes extend study into a fourth year, and focus on advanced geographical skills, exposing you to contemporary interdisciplinary debates at the cutting edge of the field.

Health and social care practitioners can make a profound difference to the lives of vulnerable people, working in a variety of settings, including healthcare, education, and public health.

Students are taught by researchers and academics with both practical experience and professional links in the sector. Our close links with NHS health trusts, local authorities, and numerous voluntary and private health organisations help to ensure that our teaching is informed by the latest developments in practice and policy. This enables you to develop a real-world understanding of contemporary healthcare challenges and how to solve them.

Facilities

Students are taught in our dedicated clinical suites within the purpose-built Sarah Swift Building. These spaces have been designed to replicate real NHS wards and home environments, allowing you to build your confidence in practice. You have access to simulated patients that feature realistic anatomy and clinical functionality, along with CPR mannequins that can help you develop your decision-making skills, which can be used during placements. You may also have the chance to participate in our inter-professional scenario days where you can work with colleagues across other healthcare programmes and organisations, such as Lincolnshire Fire and Rescue. This provides the opportunity to put theory into practice during simulations of real-life scenarios with patients.

Placements and Work Experience

Placements are mandatory across our nursing, midwifery, and paramedic science programmes. They are designed to prepare you to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing clinical environment whether this is in a hospital, GP surgery, or community healthcare setting. Students on our BSc (Hons) Paramedic Science can expect core frontline ambulance placements with East Midlands Ambulance Service.

The majority of our placements are spread across Lincolnshire, so you may get the opportunity to gain experience in a wide range of rural, urban, and coastal locations. Placements take place in professional settings and you should expect to work a variety of shift lengths, including nights, just as you would when working as a qualified professional.


Course-specific Funding and Bursaries


Our Courses

Lincoln's BSc (Hons) Health and Social Care blends policy and practice to introduce the underpinning theories, skills, and knowledge of health and social care. You can explore wider contexts of mental health and wellbeing, and equality and diversity, and align your studies to your interests and career aspirations by selecting from a range of optional modules.

Underpinned by national policy, our BSc (Hons) Midwifery allows you to study core themes of practice and care, alongside anatomical, physiological, and sociological theories. You can investigate the discipline from a global perspective, recognising diversity and culture alongside ethics and the law. Upon successful completion of the degree, you'll be eligible to register as a midwife with the UK's professional regulator, the Nursing and Midwifery Council.



Health Studies at Lincoln is ranked 3rd overall in the UK in the Complete University Guide 2023.



The University offers three distinct nursing degree programmes that are accredited by the Nursing and Midwifery Council, meaning you can register as a qualified nurse upon graduation. Nurses are qualified medical experts who deliver effective care plans and make a real difference to the quality of people's lives.

Our BSc (Hons) Nursing (Registered Nurse - Adult) can provide you with an in-depth understanding of how to support the complex care needs of adults of all ages, the core principles behind professional and expert care, and how to apply your knowledge of the field across a diverse range of healthcare settings. You'll be able to look at a variety of themes, including managing complex adult care, using a person-centred approach, and will be encouraged to work on your own personal development and resilience.

Lincoln's BSc (Hons) Nursing (Registered Nurse -Child) explores the healthcare needs of children and young people across a variety of environments. From providing care to a newborn, to treating adolescent patients, this course is designed to help you learn how to deliver suitable treatment plans and support the wider family, including parents and carers. You can strengthen your knowledge, understanding, and skills in all three years across themes such as anatomy, decision-making, and managing complex children's

If you would like to gain the knowledge and expertise to promote mental health in a range of healthcare settings, BSc (Hons) Nursing (Registered Nurse - Mental Health) can help you build that solid foundation for taking care of people who have been diagnosed with a mental illness. You'll have the opportunity to learn how to help patients choose healthy behaviours that support more fulfilling lives, as well as recognise and treat associated symptoms of a variety of mental health disorders. You are able to

develop your knowledge and apply core nursing and professional skills throughout the course, exploring themes such as healthcare sciences, assessing and coordinating care, and personal resilience.

Endorsed by the College of Paramedics, our BSc (Hons) Paramedic Science enables you to gain the academic knowledge, clinical skills, and practical work experience needed to provide highquality healthcare as a paramedic. Key themes of anatomy and physiology will be strengthened with an examination of care across the lifespan, pathophysiology of medical conditions, and associated treatments. After graduating, you'll be eligible to apply for registration with the Health and Care Professions Council as a paramedic.

If you're looking to play a vital role within society and work with communities, families, and vulnerable adults to help improve their life outcomes, our BSc (Hons) Social Work Practice might be for you. It offers an in-depth understanding of how to work effectively as a social worker, ensuring the needs and safeguarding of service users and carers are met with confidence and professionalism. The programme is delivered via a blended learning approach, so you can take advantage of flexible ways of studying.

History, Conservation, and Philosophy

With its magnificent cathedral, a medieval castle, an original of the 1215 Magna Carta, and the International Bomber Command Centre, Lincoln is an inspiring place in which to study history and heritage and question fundamental truths.

At Lincoln, we offer a range of courses spanning history, conservation of cultural heritage, and philosophy. These programmes ask questions of the past, revealing knowledge that is relevant to how we think about ourselves and our place within society today.

Expertise

The expertise of our academics spans more than 2,000 years and several continents, including Classical Greece, the Vietnam War, sexuality in 20th Century Britain, Black history, material and visual culture, the medieval Mediterranean, and gender history.

Our academics' research-led approach enables students to pursue their studies at the cutting edge of world-leading research, guided by internationally recognised practitioners who are dedicated and skilled educators. The expertise of our academic team is reflected in the wide range of optional modules students can choose from on our courses.

The University is home to the largest centre for conservation of cultural heritage in the UK. Conservators play a key role in the protection and care of cultural heritage, preserving artworks, architecture, archaeology, and museum collections for future generations to enjoy. Conservation is a multidisciplinary subject, drawing together skills in art, science, and history, and applying these to cultural heritage. Lincoln Conservation is a specialist research and consultancy centre within the University, which undertakes a range of projects for high-profile clients, including the National Trust, English Heritage, and the V&A Museum. When opportunities arise, students may apply to work on live projects, gaining professional experience.

Facilities

You can make use of the excellent facilities and resources available on campus, including the University's Great Central Warehouse Library and the Media Archive for Central England, which houses more than 70,000 moving image records. These are

supplemented with impressive resources around the city, including the Tennyson Research Centre based at the Lincolnshire Archives, the Lincoln Museum, and the International Bomber Command Centre archives. There is also the outstanding collection of medieval manuscripts and rare books housed at Lincoln Cathedral's Wren Library – a centre for philosophical thinking since the time of the eminent 13th Century theologian, Bishop Robert Grosseteste.

Placements

Students on our history and conservation programmes are able to undertake work placements during their degree, enabling them to gain handson experience. You are encouraged to obtain your placement independently, and tutors can provide support if needed. Previous students have taken on roles in museums, heritage sites, schools, and charities, including at the Tate Modern in London, the National Museum of Denmark, and Calke Abbey in Derbyshire. Please note that if you choose to undertake optional placements, you will be responsible for covering your travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Our Courses

The built environment of Roman Lincoln and the excavated artefacts housed in the Lincoln Museum provide a unique environment for the BA (Hons) Classical Studies. This an interdisciplinary degree that enables you to study the ancient world alongside experts in history and archaeology, heritage and conservation, literary and cultural studies, and philosophy. It is designed to provide a foundation in the study of Greek and Roman history and culture, Classical art, archaeology, literature, and the Latin and Greek languages. There are opportunities to spend a term studying at one of our partner institutions in Europe or North America, or to pursue a work placement in the field between your second and third years. Please note, you will be responsible for your travel, accommodation, and general living costs during optional work placements and periods of study abroad.

BA (Hons) Conservation of Cultural Heritage offers you the chance to develop skills and knowledge in the theory and practice of conservation by working with historical materials provided by museums, historic houses, and private collections. There will be opportunities to carry out conservation treatments and scientific analysis of historical artefacts in our high-specification, purpose-built laboratories in the Peter de Wint Building. These laboratory sessions can help to familiarise you with a range of materials from different time periods and historical contexts. Your projects will increase in complexity over the duration of the programme as your skills, knowledge, and confidence grow, finishing with an exhibition of your work at the end of your final year. You can view our facilities and see where you may be studying by taking a tour of our conservation labs on our website.

BA (Hons) History at Lincoln is distinctive in the breadth of topics that you can choose to study, ranging from the Roman Empire to the present day. There are thematic pathways that allow you to curate your own degree, such as 19th Century history and medieval studies. The programme is designed to provide you with a solid foundation of historical knowledge and a range of transferable skills. You are also able to choose from a range of optional modules based on the research specialisms of our academic team. The course culminates with an extended piece of independent research.

Meanwhile, our BA (Hons) Modern History enables you to focus your study and specialise in the historical period spanning 1800 to the present day, covering British, European, American, and global history. The close focus offers the opportunity to better understand and navigate an increasingly socially, culturally, and politically complex world. You may choose to undertake a work placement or study abroad for a term at one of the University's partner institutions in Europe, North America, or Canada. Please note, you will be responsible for your travel, accommodation, and general living costs during work placements or periods of study abroad.

Our BA (Hons) Philosophy aims to give you the tools needed to think seriously about major philosophical questions about the world around us: What is the self? What is a just society? Is free will an illusion? Does God exist? It introduces key figures in the history of philosophy, including Plato, Descartes, Nietzsche, Sartre, and Wittgenstein. You can study original texts from philosophers of both the past and present to help you learn to develop and defend your own arguments, which can help you gain skills that are transferable and equip you for a range of career

paths. During the programme, you can explore ethics, metaphysics, philosophy of mind, epistemology, logic, philosophy of religion, feminist philosophy, Indian philosophy, philosophy of love and sex, legal and political philosophy, and philosophy of science.

International Relations

Professionals working in international relations have an in-depth understanding of the impact of political, economic, and cultural forces. They are adept at balancing these dynamics to maintain peace and trade in a complex, globalised world.

Lincoln offers three degrees that cover the breadth of international relations alongside the closely linked fields of politics and social policy, aiming to provide a structured approach to understanding the crossborder factors that shape societies.

Teaching on the courses is driven by the latest developments in the discipline, and our academics are currently engaged in research across a range of specialisms, including terrorism, gender and sexuality, migration, security, international political economy, war crimes and genocide, the politics of global health, and the European Union.

Work Placement

You can gain valuable experience of a professional policy environment during a voluntary work placement with a local council. Here you'll be able to observe how policy is set by central government and executed by local authorities, revealing how competing priorities can result in different decisions being made about where to allocate resources. Those who choose to undertake a work placement are responsible for covering their travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Field Trips and Study Abroad

In recent years, students have undertaken field trips to key international organisations, and national and international political institutions, to destinations including New York, Washington DC, Brussels, and The Hague. You'll also have the option to apply for a study abroad year at one of our partner institutions. Students undertaking field trips or studying abroad will need to cover their travel, accommodation, and general living costs, but won't pay a tuition fee during the study abroad year.

Our Courses

Central issues and concepts in international relations and global and UK politics are explored in our BA (Hons) International Relations. As the course progresses, you can investigate the theoretical foundations of the subject, and optional modules in specialist areas spanning global, national, and local levels of analysis allow you to tailor the degree to suit your interests. Expanding on this, you'll be able to undertake independent study in a research area of your choice.

On our BA (Hons) International Relations and Politics you have the opportunity to explore key themes on British government and global politics, alongside the concepts that underpin the disciplines of politics and international relations. You can examine the core foundations of these subjects throughout the course, while choosing from an array of optional modules that match your career goals and aspirations.

Drawing on a range of social science disciplines, Lincoln's **BA** (Hons) International Relations and Social Policy explores how international relationships are formed and examines the impact they have on social policies and the way people live their lives. Diverse topics, including intelligence and national security, human rights, and war crimes, can be built upon by undertaking an independent research study in an area of your choice. You can also enhance your skill set with one of our extracurricular modern language courses including French, German, Spanish, Italian, and Mandarin Chinese, at an additional cost. Journalism

The opportunity to shape our understanding of the world through words, images, and stories is one of the most important skills for the 21st Century. Journalists provide a crucial role in society, conveying the views of all demographics and providing a voice for the voiceless.

At Lincoln, our journalism programmes are designed for aspiring communicators to make their mark, offering a multimedia grounding with opportunities to specialise in specific media and genres. Our programmes are continually revised to reflect advances in digital news production and are delivered by professionals who bring a diverse range of experience and expertise.

Facilities

A digital newsroom culture offers the chance to develop the skills and instincts of a journalist, from spotting a scoop to developing in-depth feature ideas. You can make use of a suite of newsrooms, with associated workstations and specialist print production software. Broadcast journalism is catered for with exclusive access to our radio and television presentation studios, and opportunities for output on the University's Ofcom-licensed community radio station. There is a TV studio which enables you to use the latest virtual studio technology to produce television news programmes. Free access to Adobe Creative Cloud software is also currently available to students.

Professional Experience

Work experience forms an integral part of our journalism courses and students are encouraged to seek placements as soon as possible. The University has established industry links which can help students to secure placements with media organisations. Please note that students will need to cover their own travel, accommodation, and general living costs while undertaking placements.

There are also opportunities with the on-campus radio station, Siren Radio, and a range of student media outlets you can get involved in, including LSJ News, magazines, websites, social media, and TV webcasting.

Industry Recognition

The University's journalism programmes are recognised for excellence by the European Journalism Training Association. Some of our courses are also accredited by the National Council for the Training of Journalists, and the Professional Publishers Association. These are highlighted in the course descriptions in this prospectus and on the course pages of our website.

Our Courses

Our BA (Hons) Journalism is accredited by the National Council for the Training of Journalists and the Professional Publishers Association, the lead body for training and development in the magazine industry. It is designed to prepare aspiring journalists to produce news content to a print or broadcast standard, introducing the fundamental principles of journalistic practice and providing a multi-platform approach to content creation. You can examine journalism in its historical and theoretical contexts, exploring ethical and legal considerations, and put this into practice by producing news and feature content across print, online, radio, and television platforms in our newsrooms.

BA (Hons) Journalism Studies goes beyond uncovering and crafting a good story; it explores the rich history of the profession and the important role it plays in our society. You can gain an informed understanding of the role of journalism in society. and the intellectual and practical skills required to succeed professionally as a journalist, examining the history, theories, and research techniques that underpin the practice of journalism. Understanding the social role of the journalist involves an exploration of the environment of journalism and its historical, social, political, economic, and legal settings, both in the UK and internationally.

Our BA (Hons) Sports Journalism is a specialist course offering you the opportunity to develop core journalistic skills in preparation for a career in the media, working within local, national, and international sport. The course is accredited by the National Council for the Training of Journalists and combines core journalistic skills with an understanding of the commercial aspects of sports reporting. You are able to gain an insight into the financial and business elements of national and international sports, as well as the cultural and social implications of reporting sport in the contemporary world. You can also develop your understanding of digital and multiplatform broadcast journalism, and apply that knowledge in project work, enabling you to focus on aspects of the sports industry that align with your specific interests and career aspirations.

Law

The rule of law is the cornerstone of any just and fair society. To be administered correctly, it requires skilled and knowledgeable legal professionals.

The University of Lincoln's law degrees are designed to produce independent, enquiring, and knowledgeable graduates. They can act as the first step towards a career in the legal profession, providing the key skills and knowledge needed to go on and study towards qualifications as a barrister or solicitor.

Professional Practice

At Lincoln, we place a strong emphasis on helping you gain confidence in professional practice. During your time with us, we will encourage you to develop your practical legal skills by entering competitions in mooting and negotiation.

Our Moot Court is a mock-court environment that enables you to gain experience of what it would be like to work in a real courtroom. You'll have the opportunity to experience key themes of modern legal practice across a variety of courtroom roles, and the court features a judge's bench, witness stand, and clerk's desk, alongside prosecution and defence solicitor's benches.

There may also be opportunities to sharpen your skills by getting involved in the Lincoln Law Clinic as part of your studies. The clinic provides pro-bono legal advice to staff and students at the University and enables you to apply your knowledge to real cases.

Some of our courses offer a professional practice year. giving you the chance to gain hands-on experience in a real business setting or law firm. You don't have to pay tuition fees for this year, but will need to cover travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Study Abroad

You may have the opportunity to study abroad between the second and third years of your course. Previous destinations have included Norway, South Africa, and Japan. Places are limited and allocated competitively, subject to academic criteria. Students who choose to study abroad are responsible for their travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Our Courses

If you want to take the steps needed to become a legal professional, our LLB (Hons) Law can advance your understanding of the law and how it operates in practice. The course provides a solid foundation by examining fundamental law practice and constitutional law, as well as the principles behind contract and tort law. As the course progresses, you'll be able to build your knowledge by selecting from optional modules that can tailor your studies to suit your own interests. You can also use this course as the basis to become a solicitor, via a Solicitor's Qualifying Exam route.

Our LLB (Hons) Law and Criminology offers you the chance to gain key knowledge and understanding of legal practice alongside the synergies of criminology. You begin by studying constitutional and administrative law, constitutions of European Union law, and the complexities of land law. You will also consider key aspects of criminology and criminal justice by exploring images of crime. Later, you can investigate the substantial themes of war crimes and genocide, as well as human rights at a

conceptual and practical level, and from both a legal and criminological perspective. Finally, the principles of equity and trusts provide an insight into the basis of the English legal system.

LLB (Hons) Law for Business aims to provide you with an understanding of the causes and effects of criminal behaviour and knowledge of commercial law. You'll be introduced to core topics, including law and business in a global context, legal systems, and contract law. You can strengthen your knowledge by choosing modules that investigate a range of key themes across employment law, the sale of commercial goods, and the application of company law.

Our Courses

Our BA (Hons) Business and Management, which is currently accredited by the Chartered Management Institute, encourages you to think and act as a manager, develop your critical-thinking skills, and build a broad knowledge of core business subject areas for potential careers in private, public, or third sector organisations. You'll tackle subjects which underpin

business practice, such as finance, organisational behaviour, and economics, before moving on to more complex aspects of management, including sustainability, leadership, innovation, operations, and budgeting. Later, the course allows you to explore areas such as ethics, crisis management, financial management, and global marketing strategy.

Our BA (Hons) Business with Entrepreneurship

gives you the opportunity to learn about business management and theory to help you start your own business or acquire key employability skills. You can study business law, ethical and socially responsible entrepreneurship, the principles of business and operational management, e-business, and marketing. You are encouraged to work in a creative and strategic way to develop a business plan by yourself or with a group of fellow students, formulating ideas and starting up your own business. Students can utilise the University's on-campus business incubation centre, Sparkhouse (subject to availability).

You can specialise by choosing from a range of modules designed to help your employability in a broad range of logistics sectors and disciplines.





Mathematics

At Lincoln, our research-informed degrees have been designed to offer a fundamental education in the field, including pure and applied mathematics. The School of Mathematics and Physics aims to provide a friendly, approachable culture for students to join, encouraging them to apply imagination, creativity, and rigour to the solution of various problems throughout their studies.

Research Informed

You can work alongside our experienced academic staff on challenging projects, which could contribute to academic research or collaboration with industry. Teaching on all of our programmes is conducted by

academic members of staff who are active researchers in their fields, and this research directly informs teaching at all levels.

Accreditation

Our programmes are accredited by the Institute of Mathematics and its Applications (IMA) and meet the educational requirements of the Chartered Mathematician designation. This is awarded by the IMA, when it is followed by subsequent training and experience in employment to obtain equivalent competences to those specified by the Quality Assurance Agency for taught Master's degrees.

Science Foundation Year

Our programmes are available with a Science

Foundation Year, designed to open up a pathway of study to those who may not meet the standard entry requirements. For more information, please visit our website at www.lincoln.ac.uk/course/sfvsfvub/.

Our Courses

Most of our mathematics programmes are available as three-year BSc (Hons) or four-year integrated Master's programmes, which enable you to progress to more advanced and in-depth topics, with a greater focus on independent project work.

Our BSc (Hons) and MMath Mathematics cover the core topics of mathematics and provide a thorough grounding in analytical and numerical methods. practical scientific skills, and research techniques. You are encouraged to develop transferable communication, problem-solving, and decisionmaking skills throughout your studies.

BSc (Hons) and MSci Mathematics and Computer Science offer a broad education in applied and pure mathematics, coupled with the opportunity to develop the analytical and problem-solving skills associated with computer science. You can study topics including algebra, calculus, programming fundamentals, and artificial intelligence, before progressing to select from a range of optional modules covering subjects such as machine learning, cyber security, and logic and computation.

Our BSc (Hons) and MMath Mathematics and Theoretical Physics give you the opportunity to explore the interplay between these two disciplines, and the ways in which they co-exist and complement each other. They aim to provide a broad education in mathematics, including pure and applied mathematics, alongside the fundamentals of physics, enabling you to develop the knowledge and problemsolving skills vital to modern science and technology. Topics include algebra, calculus, electricity and magnetism, and thermal and quantum physics.

BSc (Hons) Mathematics with Philosophy combines a foundation of pure and applied mathematics with the study of philosophy. This reflects the complementary nature of these two disciplines to help explain our world and our place within it. The course aims to provide you with the knowledge and ability to tackle quantifiable problems, and to analyse issues and question assumptions. The philosophy aspect focuses on concepts of philosophical logic, the philosophy of science, and the Newtonian revolution.

Medicine

Doctors play a vital role in the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of illness, disease, and iniury.

You can apply to study for the University of Nottingham's BMBS Medicine at the University of Lincoln. It offers the chance to develop the skills and knowledge needed to become a practising doctor, while enjoying the amazing student experience Lincoln has become known for. You will be registered with the University of Nottingham and upon successful completion of the course will receive a University of Nottingham degree award.

At Lincoln Medical School, we aim to ensure that our future doctors learn from experience, working with

local Lincolnshire NHS trusts. The course offers a varied placement experience at major hospitals and primary care facilities, providing the opportunity to gain hands-on clinical experience from the beginning.

Purpose-built Facilities

Our medical students are based in the University of Lincoln's brand-new purpose-built Ross Lucas Medical Sciences Building. The building features lecture theatres, laboratories, a clinical skills suite equipped with simulation facilities, a prosection anatomy suite, and a science library.

Excellent Links

Our students benefit from established links with NHS and other healthcare providers across Lincolnshire.

You will have the opportunity to interact with patients through regular visits to general practices and hospitals, and will also have the chance to explore the science and art of practising medicine with a highly skilled team of researchers, teachers, and clinicians.

Our Courses

The five-year BMedSci BMBS Medicine course begins with modules designed to develop an understanding of the scientific and professional basis of medicine. You will then progress to study overarching clinical conditions that cover respiratory and cardiovascular medicine, cancer, the musculoskeletal system and trauma, gastrointestinal medicine, endocrine and reproductive medicine, renal medicine, and the central nervous system.

There is the opportunity to gain clinical experience in the early stages of the course through GP placements and hospital visits, designed to develop professional behaviour from the outset. You will also have the chance to interact with scientists and qualified doctors and hear more about their areas of specialist interest and their unique working environments.

In the third year of the five-year programme, you'll study advanced medical science topics and undertake a supervised research project leading to the award of BMedSci, before progressing into the clinical phases of the course where you rotate through a series of placements in hospital, community, and primary care trusts throughout Lincolnshire.

Lincoln also offers a six-year BMBS Medicine with a Foundation Year to widen access to medicine study. During the foundation year, you'll study various modules required to support your learning throughout the subsequent five years of the course, in addition to being introduced to key topics of professionalism and communication.

Performing Arts

Bringing together dance, drama, and music, the performing arts have been vital forms of self-expression for centuries.

At Lincoln, we offer a range of undergraduate programmes spanning the breadth of the performing arts. We take a blended approach to learning, linking the academic study of the arts with the practical and creative disciplines of technique, performance, and production.

You are able to explore a variety of genres and influential musical theatre writers, playwrights, musicians, and choreographers, and develop your own style of performance. No matter which course you choose, our practice-led approach and excellent industry links are designed to prepare you for a successful career in the performing arts.

Facilities

Students can make use of a range of bespoke spaces and resources in Lincoln Performing Arts Centre – a professional theatre based on campus. The centre provides a hub of creative performance where our students can learn and practise their art in the 450-seat professional working theatre, large industry-standard studio spaces, and a workshop for building sets and props.

You can also benefit from soundproofed practice and rehearsal rooms; a multitrack studio with dual control room; three recording areas with a live room, dead room, and drum isolation booth for music and drama production; six audio editing suites; four radio production studios; and The Platform – a 350-capacity versatile music venue with integrated in-house PA system.

Performance Opportunities

Our performing arts students have opportunities to create and participate in performances, trips, and events with a range of partners, including students from other programmes, professional artists and performers, and external organisations.

You may apply to join The Lincoln Company, a professional collaboration between students, staff, and practising artists, which performs existing and original works at venues across the country, including runs at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. If you join the visit, you will be expected to contribute towards costs.

Some of our courses also include a work placement element, giving you the chance to gain hands-on experience in industry. If you choose this option, you will need to cover your own travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Expertise

Our performing arts programmes are led by professional performers, theatre-makers, and industry specialists with experience working in the industry all over the world, from the West End to Hollywood. You are able to benefit from this expertise which encompasses a wide range of professions, disciplines, and media. Workshops and masterclasses are also delivered by visiting tutors and professionals, offering further opportunities to learn from industry experts.

Our Courses

BA (Hons) Dance offers an industry-designed, practice-based curriculum that reflects the vocational needs of professional working artists. It gives you the opportunity to engage with a range of methods to become stronger dancers, leaders, and more dynamic dance-makers. Practical dance classes take place every day and may include contemporary technique and commercial-based practices, anatomy and fitness, choreography and performance (live, digital, and site-specific), and dance management and teaching. This is complemented by a range of extracurricular opportunities to help develop your skills and prepare you for a range of careers in the creative industry.

BA (Hons) Drama and English is an interdisciplinary joint honours programme that allows you to engage with the majority of modules available on both the drama and the English degrees, providing full access to the range of unique opportunities offered by both programmes. English considers literature from a variety of academic, historical, and cultural perspectives, while the theatre and performance components allow you to encounter creative practice, technical theatre, and performance skills together with a critical study of drama and theatre.

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Led by experts in drama and theatre research, professional performers, theatre-makers, and industry specialists, BA (Hons) Drama and Theatre is designed to prepare students for a range of careers in drama, theatre, and the cultural industries. It explores theatre and performance from a variety of current and global perspectives, including different

cultures, histories, politics, aesthetics, and ethics. This enables you to develop your understanding of theatre and its place in modern society. You can curate your own journey through the programme, focusing on contemporary theatre practice, theatre and performance studies, or technical theatre and production.

BA (Hons) Music is a contemporary, industry-focused degree designed to help you develop your skills as a performer, composer, and collaborator within a flexible curriculum that encompasses classical, rock, pop, improvised, and traditional music. Practical skills are underpinned and enriched with an approach to studying music that promotes an understanding of musical histories, cultures, and genres, while developing the critical and reflective skills needed to articulate these connections. You are able to tailor the degree to suit your individual interests, with pathways

that focus on performance or composition, as well as scope for you to explore a wide range of practical and academic skills. There are opportunities to join ensembles including choirs, orchestras, and bands of a variety of styles. Previous students have performed at Lincoln Cathedral, for the Lincolnshire International Chamber Music Festival, and on Siren Radio.

Our BA (Hons) Musical Theatre gives you the opportunity to reflect critically on performance practices, while developing core practical skills. You can hone your skills by immersing yourself in the process of producing and performing musicals. You can also engage in complementary historical and contextual analysis to aid your development as a thinking performer and creative practitioner. As the course progresses, you can learn about the history of musicals and their significance in contemporary society, while undertaking more independent. industry-focused tasks, emphasising employability and preparing you for a wide range of careers within the creative industries.

BA (Hons) Technical Theatre and Stage

Management focuses on developing creative professionals with an academic and vocational understanding of industry roles and responsibilities. including stage management, stage lighting, live audio, design for the stage, health and safety, and the technical standards for places of entertainment. It enables you to develop core practical skills while working in a range of professional environments including stage spaces, workshops, rehearsal rooms, and design labs. The course promotes an exploration of new practices and technologies, and balances

vocational training, design, and academic study. Students can practise their craft across a wide range of performance and creative disciplines and are able to apply their work in professional theatres and various arts environments.

Our aim is to produce passionate pharmacists and pharmaceutical scientists who are adept at addressing the healthcare challenges we face in the 21st Century.

At Lincoln, students are encouraged to develop the skills and experience needed to play a key role in helping to shape future pharmacy practice, and those sought by the pharmaceutical and biotechnology industries.

You can learn from and work alongside experienced academic staff who are often involved in innovative research projects to develop new models of pharmaceutical care, or are working to address

challenges faced by today's pharmaceutical industry. The University's School of Pharmacy also has excellent links with local hospitals, community pharmacists, and other healthcare professionals, providing additional learning opportunities.

Specialist Facilities

You can benefit from access to purpose-built laboratory space and specialist equipment in the University's Joseph Banks Laboratories. This offers specialist clinical and teaching spaces, including consultation rooms, a medicines information suite, a clinical skills suite, and well-equipped research laboratories.

Our Courses

BSc (Hons) Pharmaceutical Science encompasses a range of scientific disciplines, introducing you to the exciting world of drug discovery, development, and management. The course offers an insight into the structure, function, and mechanisms of drugs; how different drugs can act on the human body; and how their potentially lifesaving effects can be harnessed safely. You are introduced to core subjects that are fundamental to pharmaceutical science, such as chemistry, cell biology, human anatomy, and disease. Later, modules introduce more advanced subjects as well as the regulatory and ethical standards that apply to industry professionals.

Our four-year MSci Applied Pharmaceutical Science follows a similar structure to the BSc (Hons) Pharmaceutical Science but with an additional final year. During this year, you can use the knowledge gained in the previous years to lead projects which aim to solve problems currently experienced in the pharmaceutical industry, and have the chance to work alongside an experienced academic on an independent research project. A placement module also provides the chance to develop professional skills by spending time working with an industrial partner.

For students interested in playing an active role in the running and management of pharmaceutical businesses, or in careers as leaders in the pharmaceutical and biotechnology industries, the four-year MSci Pharmaceutical Science with Business Management provides a solid foundation. It enables you to lead on projects which address real-world problems currently faced by the pharmaceutical industry, and additionally offers the chance to develop an understanding of how your decisions in the management of these projects can have business implications. You can study topics including teams and leadership, project planning and management, and business regulation and ethics.

MPharm Pharmacy combines the science of medicines and disease with the development of the patient-facing decision-making skills and professional practice required by modern pharmacists. The course has full accreditation from the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC), enabling you to progress to a foundation training year, after which you can register as a pharmacist if you meet all of the professional criteria set by the GPhC. The course introduces the science underpinning how drugs are developed and produced, and how they interact with the body. Modules follow the lifecycle of the patient, initially in a healthy state, and then from the perspective of disease and ill health. You will have the opportunity to undertake practice placements within hospital, community, and primary care settings.

Physics

Physics is a fundamental science which underpins our understanding of the world around us, from distant galaxies to the smallest particles. The knowledge and problem-solving skills of physicists are vital to new discoveries and advances in science and technology.

Research Informed

At Lincoln, teaching is informed by research, and our students have the chance to work on real-world research projects with our academic staff. Students have recently collaborated on a range of projects with Dr Phil Sutton, focusing on topics including exoplanets, planetary rings, and gravitational waves.

Specialist Facilities

Students are based in the Isaac Newton Building. This facility promotes education and research collaboration with the School of Engineering and the School of Computer Science. Physics students also have access to equipment for advanced materials characterisation techniques, such as electron microscopy and X-ray diffractometry, in the Joseph Banks Laboratories.

Science Foundation Year

Our physics programmes are available with a Science Foundation Year designed to open up a pathway of study to those who may not meet the standard entry requirements. For more information, please visit our website at www.lincoln.ac.uk/course/sfvsfyub/.

Our Courses

All of our physics programmes are available as threevear BSc (Hons) or four-year integrated Master's programmes, which enable you to progress to more advanced and in-depth topics, with a greater focus on independent project work.

Our BSc (Hons) and MPhys Physics combine theory with practical laboratory work and substantial research training. Throughout the courses, there are extensive opportunities for you to hone practical skills in preparation for a career in a variety of sectors. During the first year, you can benefit from an additional three hours per week of problem-solving tutorials. The programmes include compulsory and optional modules covering all components of core physics, as defined by the Institute of Physics.

Our BSc (Hons) and MPhys Physics with Astrophysics aim to equip students with the reasoning and analytical skills to tackle problems with no known answers. Astrophysics provides training in space science, Earth observation, and physics of extreme conditions, and this degree aims to develop students' abilities to think outside the box. The course offers the opportunity to study fundamental and applied physics with astrophysics alongside rigorous mathematics and computational training.

The joint BSc (Hons) and MPhys Physics with Philosophy introduce fundamental and applied physics, while developing a philosophical understanding of the world we live in and the place we occupy within it. Combining physics with philosophy offers you the chance to study, reflect on, and understand scientific material, and you can apply philosophical theory and ask fundamental questions to investigate, enhance, and expand knowledge.

BSc (Hons) and MMath Mathematics and Theoretical Physics enable you to explore the interplay between these two disciplines, and the ways in which they co-exist and complement each other. They aim to provide a broad education in mathematics, including pure and applied mathematics, alongside the fundamentals of physics, enabling you to develop the knowledge and problemsolving skills vital to modern science and technology. Topics include algebra, calculus, electricity and magnetism, and thermal and quantum physics.

Politics

From US and Middle Eastern politics to the big political issues of the day in Britain, look beyond the headlines and explore concepts of power, democracy, and justice with a degree in politics at the University of Lincoln.

Our politics programmes examine a wealth of domestic and global politics, and specific issues surrounding political theory, nationalism, gender, migration, and international relations. They enable you to explore the big issues facing the world, and study the social and academic contexts that underpin these developments. In doing so, you can develop your analytical, evaluative, and critical-thinking skills, and learn how to collect and analyse data, and draft policy proposals.

Expertise

Students studying politics at Lincoln can benefit from research-active academics. The team's research projects have explored parliamentary reform, political participation by young people, and scrutiny of the intelligence services, and have helped to inform our curriculum and approaches to teaching. This helps us ensure that our students are aware of, and informed by, ideas and information at the cutting edge of the subject.

Field Trips and Placements

Students can choose to participate in field trips to key international organisations, and national and international political institutions. In recent years, students have visited New York, Washington DC,

Ypres, Brussels, The Hague, Berlin, Kraków, Geneva, and Strasbourg. There may also be opportunities to undertake unpaid, competitive work placements with a local council, which can offer experience of a professional policy environment. Please note, vou'll be responsible for your own travel, accommodation, and general living costs when undertaking optional field trips and work placements.

Study Abroad

After completing your second year of study, you'll be able to apply for a study abroad year at one of our partner institutions. You won't need to pay a tuition fee to either the University of Lincoln or the host university, but you will be required to cover your own travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Our Courses

Our BA (Hons) Politics offers an introduction to the structures of power, relationships between nations, and key concepts in the social sciences. You can explore the principles behind politics and related disciplines, and learn how to apply this knowledge to a range of global settings. You'll be able to investigate how those wielding power are held to account, and examine contemporary political challenges, including migration, gender, and inequality.

In addition to our BA (Hons) Politics, the University also offers two joint honours programmes, combining the discipline with social policy and sociology.

Our BA (Hons) Politics and Social Policy aims to increase your knowledge of how to tackle a range of political and social global challenges. You'll have the opportunity to develop your transferable research and analytical skills from the outset. As the course progresses, you can gain an understanding of core themes that encompass British politics, political theory, and processes behind policy implementation. You can also choose from a range of optional modules to tailor the degree to suit your career aspirations.

BA (Hons) Politics and Sociology considers the impact of major social changes and the development of policies to deal with these challenges. You can gain an understanding of the breadth of topics encompassed under the political agenda, with key themes including the relationship between domestic and international politics, the history of sociology, and the British political system. You'll also have the chance to investigate counterterrorism, analyse policy processes, and explore the contemporary principles of a global civil society.

Psychology

Psychology integrates the scientific study of behaviour, mental health, and neurophysiological functioning to explore what makes us human, and why we think the way we do.

Lincoln's psychology courses are accredited by the British Psychological Society, meaning you'll have the opportunity to work towards becoming a chartered psychologist after you graduate. The programmes are designed to provide a foundation in the concepts and practices of applied psychology, while enabling you to develop a specialism in either forensic or mental health psychology.

Research

You'll be able to learn from our expert team of academics, all of whom are research-active in their fields. Their areas of interest span developmental, cognitive, behavioural, neuroscientific, and forensic psychology. During your studies, you may have the chance to take part in supervised, empirical research projects within these disciplines in order to develop and strengthen your skills in meta-analysis, methodology, and qualitative and quantitative research. Current research questions being explored by our staff and students include the impact of Covid-19 on mental health, the effect of human activity on habitat selection in the Barbary macaque, and online dating behaviours using the science of facial attractiveness.

Facilities

The University has invested £19 million in the Sarah Swift Building, which is home to the School of Psychology. You can study in specialist research spaces, which include a sleep laboratory, used for conducting research into sleep and wellbeing, the neuroscience of sleep, and sleep in the community; EEG laboratories, where you can explore activation patterns in the brain in response to different stimuli; and a motor lab, where you can examine biomechanical motion and perceptions of motion, and which is home to two MIRAGE systems that allow visual manipulation of limbs to measure impact on performance. A driving simulator, which can be used to monitor driving performance and analyse eye-tracking, behavioural data, and object recognition, is also available. In addition, you'll have access to ICT suites and technicians who can offer support in the design and execution of experiments.

International Study and Work Experience


Students can choose to undertake a year-long study abroad or work experience placement between the second and third years of the course. This year leads to one of two exit awards. For example, those taking an international study year for Psychology would be awarded a BSc (Hons) Psychology (International Study): while students choosing the work experience vear would receive a BSc (Hons) Psychology (Work Experience). Both of these options have been designed to enhance your future employment opportunities and help you gain a keen understanding of the field in real-world settings. These exit awards are not available for the BSc (Hons) Psychology (Sport and Exercise Psychology).

Career Opportunities

As well as working as clinical or forensic psychologists, students from our degrees use the skills and knowledge they've acquired for a broad range of careers. Some have gone on to work in education, training as an educational psychologist or a special educational needs teacher, while others have explored healthcare routes as speech and language therapists, mental health practitioners, and healthcare support workers. Our students have also followed a more forensic route, undertaking roles such as a criminal justice support worker.

Our Courses

BSc (Hons) Psychology is designed to offer a broad foundation in psychology, exploring the science behind how we think, act, and respond to others through a range of topics. You can investigate key concepts behind the discipline, including behaviours and cognitions, historical issues in psychology, and research skills to understand the qualitative and quantitative treatment of data. As the course progresses, you'll be able to select from a range of optional modules that match your interests and career aspirations. Topics can include an exploration of the mechanisms behind evolutionary psychology, human-animal interactions, addictive behaviours and associated origins, treatments, and an exploration of social cognitive neuroscience.

The programme also offers two additional specialist pathways. After the first year of study, you'll have the option to select specific modules in organisational

psychology or coaching psychology. Organisational psychology applies psychological principles and research methods to issues in the workplace, such as performance, communication, job satisfaction, and work wellbeing. Meanwhile, coaching psychology is the process of using psychological theories and approaches to enhance wellbeing and performance in personal life and work. By selecting specialist modules in these areas you can complete the related pathway and gain a specialist degree title, either BSc (Hons) Psychology (Organisational Psychology), or BSc (Hons) Psychology (Coaching Psychology).

BSc (Hons) Psychology (Sport and Exercise Psychology) explores the foundations of psychology

and its application to sport and exercise. You can gain a broad and extensive understanding of the key concepts of psychology and research, which you can develop in greater detail to help you understand how they can be applied in context. You'll be able to tailor your degree

with a range of optional modules to match your own career goals and aspirations. Topics include body image and eating disorders, the neurobiology of sleep and dreams, and cognitive behavioural therapy.

Our BSc (Hons) Psychology with Forensic Psychology explores the psychological problems associated with criminal behaviour and investigates key theories, methods, and processes and their relation to ruling justice systems. You can learn from skilled researchers who have specialist knowledge in a range of fields, including cognitive neuropsychology, mental health, and social psychology. Topics include the foundations of forensic psychology, an exploration into the complexity of prison systems, and an in-depth look into theories that attempt to explain the reasons for offending behaviour. To enhance your understanding of the ways in which crime is dealt with, you'll be able to examine existing processes within the criminal justice system, including courts and post-conviction forensic settings. Teaching on the course includes content from both registered forensic psychologists and expert researchers within the field of forensic

Our BSc (Hons) Psychology with Mental Health explores the concept of mental health and disorder in relation to psychological, cognitive, biological, and social factors and provides a detailed overview of the scope and reach of psychology in the broad field of mental health. The course introduces you to diagnostic frameworks and outlines the current understanding of a range of mental health disorders and the ways in which these link to the concepts of wellbeing. Later,

psychology.

you can strengthen your knowledge of counselling skills and theory as well as the different treatment approaches in psychology. You can also develop your interests in specific areas of mental health, such as mindfulness, addiction, cognition, wellbeing, eating disorders, and sleep. The specialist modules on the course are taught by practitioners with direct experience of working clinically with individuals with mental health difficulties, in addition to academics who have gained international reputations for their research into mental health.

Sociology and Social Policy

Creating effective social policies is a key component in tackling the big issues we face in society today. Sociology offers a range of frameworks for the study of human behaviour, examining how societies are organised, how social identities are constructed, and exploring the issues facing society's most marginalised people.

Study Abroad

To experience your subject from a new perspective, you can apply for a study abroad year at one of our partner institutions in the USA, Sweden, Belgium, Germany, or the Netherlands after your second year.

You don't have to pay tuition fees for this year, but you will need to cover travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Work Placements

Some courses offer the opportunity to undertake a voluntary work placement, where you can experience working in a professional environment and observe how policies are set and implemented. Please note, you will be responsible for travel, accommodation, and general living costs during placements.

Recent graduates of sociology and social policy have gone on to a wide variety of careers across public services, in charities, and in the private sector.

Our Courses

Our BA (Hons) Social Policy will introduce you to core concepts to help you scrutinise social policy issues in detail. You'll have the chance to examine social problems and policies at national and global levels, which can be strengthened by learning how to conduct and apply social science research. Optional modules allow you to tailor the degree to suit your own areas of interest and help you gain an understanding of how to create and implement policies that bring real change to society.

BA (Hons) Social Policy and Sociology allows you to engage in research-led teaching and gain insight into innovative academic theories and practices. You can draw upon the expertise of our academic team who are research-active in their fields. The programme provides a platform to build your knowledge base by exploring key social science concepts, social issues, and social justice. Specialist modules are designed to help you advance your discipline-specific knowledge.

The fabric of societies, the dynamics of belonging and exclusion, and the workings of political structures are just some of the topics you'll be encouraged to explore while studying our **BA** (Hons) Sociology. You'll be able to advance your understanding of academic research by learning how to refine your research skills and data analysis techniques, and you can shape your learning around your own interests by choosing from a range of optional modules.

Drawing on a range of social science disciplines, Lincoln's **BA** (Hons) International Relations and Social Policy explores how international relationships are formed and examines the impact they have on social policies and the way people live their lives. Diverse topics, including intelligence and national security, human rights, and war crimes, can be built upon by undertaking an independent research study in an area of your choice. You can also enhance your skill set with one of our extracurricular modern language courses including French, German, Spanish, Italian, and Mandarin Chinese, at an additional cost.

Sport, Health, and Exercise

Health, exercise, and nutrition professionals play an important role in tackling the health challenges we face as a society.

The University's exciting range of sport, health, and exercise degrees aims to produce confident, enthusiastic, and engaged professionals who can work in a range of complementary fields and make a positive difference.

Placements

The University has excellent professional links with the fitness industry, and our engagement with employers is ensuring that market needs and employer expectations are considered in the curriculum. Our students can undertake applied assessments and work placements in real-world settings to gain practical experience and a competitive edge when they graduate. We have strong links with the local community and work closely with Lincoln City FC, Lincoln United, and Lincolnshire Cricket, as well as the Students' Union, providing opportunities for students to offer coaching or sport science support to local teams. We also value the physical activity and health opportunities that our students receive from Active Lincolnshire and Lincoln City Football Foundation.

Facilities

You can study and carry out your research in the University's Human Performance Centre. These specialist facilities enable you to learn the fundamental applications that underpin health and exercise science, and you can access equipment from the first week of study. The dedicated practical and teaching spaces include physiology, biomechanics, and psychology laboratories, along with a specialist strength and conditioning suite, a sports therapy teaching space, and an 'endless pool'. Our facilities have been designed to help you develop your specialist knowledge, and our sport and exercise science technicians are on hand to provide help and support.

Industry Recognition

Many of our courses have professional endorsements and industry qualifications embedded within them to provide you with the knowledge and experience that employers are looking for. The programmes have been endorsed against rigorous criteria which represent employability standards for professional roles in the sport and physical activity sector. This highlights how


our content and assessment strategies are aligned to produce high-quality graduates ready for employment. To further enhance your professional development, you can take an additional work placement year in industry, and if you want to prepare yourself for employment in a global market, there are opportunities to undertake a year abroad at one of our international partners in the USA, Australia, or Europe. You don't have to pay tuition fees for the additional placement or study abroad year, but you will need to cover travel, accommodation, and general living costs.

Our Courses

BSc (Hons) Health and Exercise Science examines the theories behind physical activity, exercise, and health. It is designed to equip you with the knowledge needed to confidently provide physical activity and healthy eating recommendations. You can learn to design, implement, and evaluate health promotion projects for a range of population groups. This programme includes a placement in the second year. You can also gain additional qualifications as a Health Navigator, Gym Instructor, and Personal Trainer during the programme.



The University's Human Performance Centre provides a dedicated facility for applied work in nutrition, sport and exercise physiology, biomechanics, psychology, sports therapy, and strength and conditioning.



Our BSc (Hons) Health, Exercise and Nutrition aims to provide you with the skills needed to confidently evaluate individuals with different health needs and offer nutritional advice in relation to health and performance. You'll be able to consider the relationships between physical activity, nutrition, fitness, and disease to enable you to provide suitable evidence-based interventions. The course includes a placement in the second year, and you can gain additional qualifications as a Health Navigator, Gym Instructor, and Personal Trainer as part of the programme.

BSc (Hons) Physical Education and Sport focuses on preparing you to work with young people in a variety of settings. During each year of the course, you can undertake a placement in a school where you can develop a range of teaching skills, including planning, delivering, and considering best teaching practice. The programme provides a foundation for working

in education and youth sport development and also covers other areas, such as performance analysis, concepts and theories in psychology and social issues, and investigating sport and activity provision for people with disabilities. You can also gain an additional Working with Children qualification.

Lincoln's BSc (Hons) Sport and Exercise Science, which is endorsed by the British Association of Sport and Exercise Sciences, combines academic knowledge with the practical application of scientific principles to improve sports performance. During the course, you can gain knowledge and practical skills in areas of physiology, biomechanics, psychology, and nutrition, and develop an understanding of how they impact on sports performance, physical activity, and health. A range of optional modules is available, allowing you to tailor the degree to your own specific career goals, and you can gain additional qualifications as a Health Navigator, Gym Instructor, or Personal Trainer.

Accredited by The Society of Sports Therapists, Lincoln's **BSc** (Hons) Sport and Exercise Therapy aims to provide you with the skills needed to work within the sports therapy industry. You can put theory into practice and develop a portfolio of 200 clinical placement hours that includes carrying out sports therapy in sports clubs, clinics, and in the University's Sports Injury Clinic. Upon completion, you will be qualified to work in the industry in a sports club, private practice, or as an independent practitioner.

BSc (Hons) Sport Development and Coaching

aims to produce sports coaches who can inspire teams and individuals to achieve their goals and work across a variety of sports at a range of levels, from elite athletes to local clubs. It introduces you to areas of study including the sport development environment, physical literacy, sociological issues, and the foundations of sport and exercise science. The fundamentals of teaching, coaching, and research skills are developed during the course, and you can pursue your own personal interests by choosing from a range of optional modules. There are coaching placements in each year, and you can gain an additional professional coaching qualification.

Our BSc (Hons) Strength and Conditioning in Sport enables you to develop your knowledge, understanding, and practical skills in applied strength and conditioning, physiology, biomechanics, and nutrition. The programme, which is accredited by the International Universities Strength and Conditioning Association and recognised by the National Strength and Conditioning Association, focuses on the practical competencies needed to become a confident strength and conditioning coach. You'll have the chance to work with athletes providing strength and conditioning advice and undertake community placements in both the second and third years. There may be internship opportunities in the USA, working with college athletes. You can also gain qualifications as a Gym Instructor and Personal Trainer.
